## ACTION ON ALL-CAMPUS COUNCIL AGENDA

At the All-Campus Council Meeting on October 30 the members requested improvements in a number of areas concerning the building and its appearance. I am pleased to let you know that the following will be done soon or have been done:

1. We have now arranged to keep unlocked (between 8:30 and 4:00) the 4th floor doorway in the stairwell on the west side of the building for easy access during the day.
2. I have asked Karen Kelly to initiate action for better cleaning of faculty washrooms.
3. We will be ordering more garbage cans to be placed in stairwells and elsewhere as necessary.
4. We will request that our cleaners do a better job of cleaning blackboards and ledges.
5. We have replaced all chairs in the faculty dining area since we, too, were aware of broken chairs and a shortage of chairs.

Please note that a number of the other requests from the Council are recognized but that they may cost a good deal.

e.g. a) Placing plants in various areas and having them well cared for seems to work only with a contract given to a plant shop. Most other efforts work well only for a time.

b) Painting projects (walls, stairwells, etc.) will be done as money is available.

I appreciate the advice of the Council and look forward to completing a variety of improvements with the Council and its Chairperson, Cheryl Draper who has been invited to sit as a member of the Management Committee in her capacity as chair of the ACC.

## UPDATE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

### 1. The King Edward/Mount Pleasant Recreation Centre

Many of you know that for the past three years I have been meeting regularly with community organizations in Mount Pleasant to plan a joint college/community recreation centre.

I am pleased to announce that our efforts are showing results. Recently Vancouver City Council, on the recommendation of the Parks Board, has allocated \$400,000 towards the construction of the proposed centre. Since the present estimate of the cost is about \$4,000,000 we will now continue to seek further funding from other sources.

### 2. The Environment Committee

The Environment Committee will be meeting in November to consider ongoing projects which include:

- a) The Final Report on the campus environment (made by Sterling & Associates). If you would like a copy please let me know.
- b) Paper Recycling
- c) Campus Cleanliness
- d) Other Recycling and Conservation Projects

If you are interested in working with this committee please let me know.

### 3. The Beautification Committee

This committee, to which Jana Gaitanakis has given so much effort, will be meeting soon to discuss the recommendation of the group of student architects who worked on campus in the summer. The campus has received a special grant of \$50,000 to make some improvements, especially at the entrance from the parking lot.

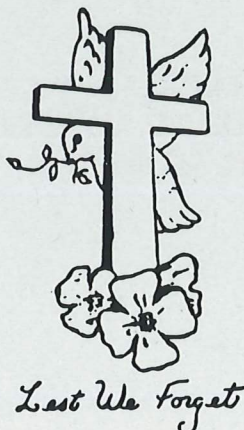
**IS THE ALL CAMPUS COUNCIL? OR IS IT NOT?**

ADULT BASIC EDUCATION STUDENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (ABESAP)

WHAT IS A.B.E.S.A.P.?

ABESAP is a program funded by the provincial government to provide tuition fees only for needy students. (Maximum of \$360.00 for 4 months of study). Only one application per term, or 1 application for 4 months of study.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO APPLY?

You can apply for ABESAP if you are a Canadian citizen, landed immigrant or have refugee status. All students with S.I.N. starting with 900 must show citizenship papers. ABESAP is available for students enrolling in one of the following programs offered at V.C.C.-King Edward Campus:

- A.S.E.H.I / A.S.E.V.I.
- Basic Education (ABE foundations)
- B.E.S.T.
- B.T.S.D. Level 3 (ABE intermediate)
- B.T.S.D. Youth
- College Foundations (up to grade 10)
- ESL - Institutional Aide
- ESL - Auto Detailer and Paint Prep.
- College Preparatory English 059
- English Language Skills (PT/FT Time)
- English As A Second Language  
(including Outreach, Canadiana Centre,  
Vocational - fee payers only)
- ESL - Business Office Training
- ESL - Cabinet Making
- Pt-time Courses at Gr. 11/12 level \*  
(CF, ABE, CPE & BTSD)

HOW CAN I APPLY?

One month before registration date, you can pick up an ABESAP application from the Financial Aid Office (#4029) or the Counselling Career Centre (#3002).

\* RETURNING STUDENTS (pink form)

If you are a returning student (have a K.E.C. student number), you must have the teacher's comment section #20 on your application completed before returning your ABESAP application to the Financial Aid Office. Returning students are advised to complete their application as quickly as possible. It takes two weeks to process your application. You can apply one month before you register !!!

\* NEW STUDENTS (green form)

If you are a NEW student (no K.E.C. student number), you can submit your application to the Financial Aid Office (#4029). You do not have to complete section #20 (teacher's comments) on your application form. You can apply one month before you register !!!

\* DEADLINE FOR APPLICATION IS ONE MONTH AFTER THE FIRST DAY OF CLASSES

PLEASE NOTE:

1) ALL full-time students who are being supported by the Ministry of Social Services and Housing (welfare) must first apply to MSSH for assistance and have MSSH provide a letter of refusal if they will not pay your tuition fees. Part-time students do not require a letter from MSSH.

NOTICE TO ALL MEMBERS AND PROSPECTIVE MEMBERS  
V.C.C. EMPLOYEE BENEFIT PLAN

The Vancouver Community College Employee Benefit Plan was established in late 1985 to provide a vehicle whereby plan members/eligible V.C.C. employees could defer a portion of their monthly income for the purpose of financing a future sabbatical leave or supplementing their retirement income. Amounts contributed to the E.B.P. were not subject to income tax until such time as payment is received by the individual from the plan in accordance with an advance tax ruling given to the plan by Revenue Canada in March of 1985.

Subsequently the Government of Canada amended the Income Tax Act to effectively disallow tax deferral except where the purpose of the deferral was to finance a future sabbatical leave. This effectively eliminated the "retirement supplement" purpose of our Employee Benefit Plan.

Your Plan Administration Committee is advised that, to ensure compliance, our plan need not be amended provided that future contributions are designated for sabbatical purposes only. Salary deferral for retirement supplement is no longer allowable effective July 1, 1986.

All present and prospective plan members/contributors who wish to defer a portion of their 1991 income for the purpose of financing a future sabbatical leave must file with the undersigned, newly completed and signed Letters of Agreement covering the calendar year 1991. The member's Letter of Agreement must be submitted no later than December 21, 1990 and shall designate for each month of the calendar year 1991 the amounts to be deducted from remuneration for that year. Plan membership and contributions by payroll deductions for the calendar year 1991 may not be authorized and accommodated after the foregoing deadline, December 21, 1990.

Contributing members may, under special circumstances with the approval of the Plan Administration Committee, supplement or amend by written agreement their designated contributions.

Full details governing the plan are found in the "Plan Rules" with a brief description also available from the Employee Relations Office along with the necessary forms (Letters of Agreement) to facilitate your 1991 enrolment. Enrolment forms have been provided, under separate cover, to current plan members.

Commencing January 1, 1991, the Trusteeship of the plan will be transferred from Montreal Trust to Canada Trust. We are assured of continued high level of quality service as Canada Trust has been a recognized leader in the field for over 25 years.

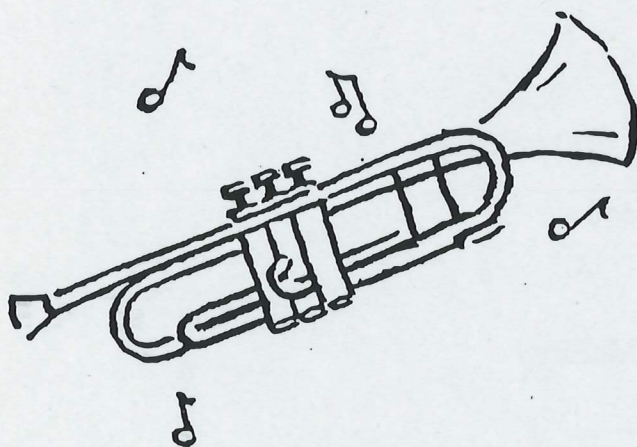

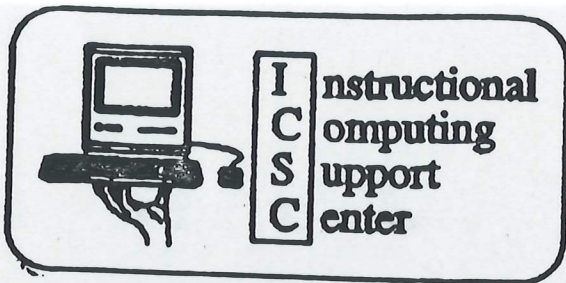

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## Computing Corner

**Copying a Graphic into a Word Processing Document:** In previous weeks, we have been discussing the transporting of files from one word processor to another. This week we will discuss importing a graphic into a word processing document. We chose as an example this Hallowe'en photo from the Business and Computer Studies Department.

First we created a **Tiff file** (see KEC Times, October 18) by scanning a colour photograph using **Scanning Gallery on the HP Scanjet in the ICSC**. Then we copied that file into this document created on **MS Word** following these steps:

**Position cursor at point where graphic is to be inserted.**

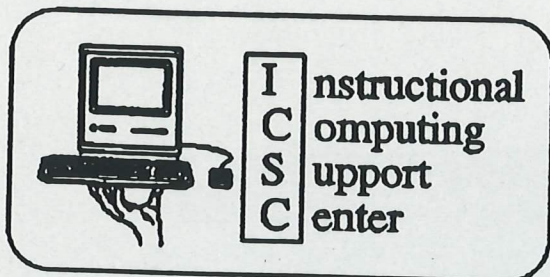


### **MS Word:**

1. **Esc L**(ibrary) **L**(ink) **G**(raphics)
2. Press **F1** and Select Tiff file to be inserted in your document (eg. B&CS.TIF)
3. From the options which now appear on the screen we chose:  
**In Alignment Frame: Centered**  
**In Graphics Frame: 3.5** (width was automatically adjusted)
4. **Press Enter** to import the graphic
5. The name of the file only (eg..G.A\B&CS>TIF;3.5";733;TIFF) will appear on the page, but if you choose the **Print** option to **preView**, you will see the full graphic appear on the screen.
6. To create the frame surrounding the picture, press:  
**Esc F B**
7. Caption Font Chosen: **Zapf Chancery size 12**
8. Save and print as usual

## Computing Corner

### Instructions for importing a graphic into Word Perfect 5.1

#### Word Perfect 5.1:

1. Press **Alt-F9** (**Graphics**) **F**(Figure) **O**(Options)
2. Press **B 2 2 2 2** (Single line all around)
3. Press **P** to position caption
4. Press **Enter** to complete setup.
5. Press **Alt F9** (**Graphics**) **F**(Figure) **C**(Create)
6. Press **F** (Filename, eg. B&CS.TIF) **Enter**
7. Press **S**(Size) **2**(Set Height/Autowidth) Type the number of inches high you wish the picture to be (eg. 3.5) **Enter**
8. Press **C**(Caption). Type in the caption (eg. Greetings from etc.)
9. Press **F7**
10. Press **Enter** and continue entering your text.
11. Save and Print as usual

A photograph such as the one we chose contains a very large number of dots when scanned. Therefore, it takes a long time to print so be prepared for a wait of about 15 minutes. A different type of graphic will print much more quickly.

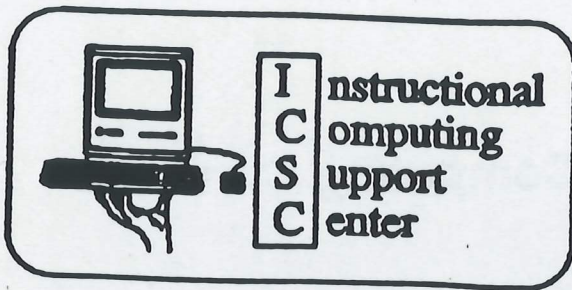

## INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION NEWS

### CIDA AWARDS FOR CANADIANS

Up to 50 awards are available on an annual basis to Canadians wishing to further their develop their expertise in the field of International development. The awards are worth up to \$25,000 per year and may be tenable for a maximum of two years.

#### Eligibility

Applicants must:

- be Canadian citizens; landed immigrants are not eligible
- possess an undergraduate degree or diploma by the time of the award
- have a definite commitment and suitability for a career in the field of international development

#### Program Requirements

Applicants must develop a program which:

- addresses a specific development need or problem
- has a clear practical orientation as opposed to consisting solely of academic or research studies
- involves practical work or study, or a professional work attachment with a public or private organization or agency involved in international development, or a development oriented academic program including a practical fieldwork component
- lasts for a period of between 7 and 24 months
- includes a program related field worked component in a developing country eligible for Canadians Official Development assistance (ODA), and lasting at least 25% of the total program fieldwork has the endorsement of a program supervisor who is familiar with the work of the candidates is actively involved in the candidate's program and is an expert in the candidates proposed field of specialization
- meets the need for further knowledge and expertise in the candidate's chosen field of specialization.

If an academic portion is included, it should be tenable at a Canadian institution. Academic studies may be undertaken outside Canada if the program sought is not available in Canada.

Preference will be accorded to practical proposals contributing to the growth of Canadian international development expertise in the following fields of specialization:

Recipients will be selected twice a year. Deadlines for the receipt of applications are February 12th and September 3rd. Candidates will be notified of the results the following June and December.

Applications to the February deadline are for programmes commencing no earlier than the following July. Applications to the September deadline are for programmes commencing no earlier than the following January.

Applicants may not request funding to be applied retroactively in the case of a program already in progress.
