ESL BIBLIOGRAPHY PUBLISHED

The English as a Second Language Bibliography has just been released by VCC Press. Compiled by KEC librarians Phyllis Butler and Aphrodite Harris, the Bibliography is an annotated list of over 300 books, audiotapes, video recordings and other ESL resources. All titles are held by the KEC Library, which represents one of North America's most comprehensive ESL collections.

All entries have been arranged in a classified format composed of eleven broad subject areas such as Listening Comprehension, Grammar, Pronunciation, Writing, Testing and Study Skills and so on. While each entry contains the usual information such as author, title and publisher, additional features render the Bibliography especially useful: A full description of contents is given if the item consists of more than just a text. The user is alerted to the presence of Canadian or cross-cultural content. Student learning level such as Beginning, Intermediate, etc., is indicated, and is based on application and usage as practiced at KEC. Other features of interest include mention of whether the item contains timed readings, picture stories or is useful for teaching handwriting. Comprehensive Sets - various levels of interactive materials presented in multiple volumes - are also identified. Call numbers have been provided for every item, facilitating quick access in the Library.

Each item is annotated, the average entry running to a paragraph in length. Annotations are descriptive rather than evaluative, and are consistently clear and succinct. Author and title indexes have been included as well as a "Special Features" index which provides uniform access to some of the elements described above. There is also a publishers' address list.

While not every ESL item owned by the Library is included - indeed the collection is an organic entity, growing and changing as needs change - several criteria were employed to create a product combining comprehensiveness with utility. Faculty recommendation and popularity with borrowers were certainly high on the list, along with currency (very few items produced before 1980 are included), the presence of Canadian Content and any unique features.

The English as a Second Language Bibliography is a valuable reference tool suitable for all instructors, student teachers and librarians with a professional interest in ESL. It is available at the KEC Bookstore for \$11.95. Additional copies may also be ordered from the Langara Campus Bookstore.





Computing Corner

Many computer users are expert on a particular program, perhaps a word processor, but not at all sure of how to format a disk or copy a file from one disk to another disk.

Question: How do I format a disk?

Answer: When you purchase a disk either a 51/2 inch disk or a 31/2 inch disk, it cannot be used straight away on your computer. It is a blank disk. You must organize the surface in such a way that your system knows how to use that particular disk. This process is called Formatting a Disk. To format a disk:

- 1. When C:\> appears on your screen insert your disk in the floppy disk drive.
- 2. Type:

FORMAT A: if the disk is in Drive A FORMAT B: if the disk is in Drive B

- 3. A message on the screen will instruct you when to press ENTER.
- 4. A light will appear on the drive in which you have placed the disk. This light means that the disk is being formatted. When formatting is complete, you will be asked if you wish to format another disk. Type Y if you wish to do so, otherwise type N.
- 5. Remove the disk from the drive and insert in its envelope.

The disk is now formatted and ready to be used in your computer.

Question: How do I copy a file from one disk to another.


Answer: If you are copying a file from the hard drive to a floppy drive, for example a file called LETTER.DOC

- 1. At the C:> prompt, insert your floppy disk in drive A.
- 2. Type: Copy letter.doc A: (Enter)
- 3. The message One file copied will appear on the screen when complete.

To copy from one floppy drive to another:

- 1. Insert the disk with the file to be copied in Drive A
- 2. Insert a formatted disk in Drive B
- 3. Type Copy A:letter.doc B:
- 4. The message One file copied will appear on the screen when copying is complete


