


It should be noted that tasting should constitute a part of every club meeting. These meetings should be on a monthly basis, and perhaps themes for tasting could be developed.





Computing Corner

- If I create a file in WordPerfect 5.1 at work, can I then work on it at home on WordPerfect 5.0?
- Yes, a file which has been created in WordPerfect 5.1 may be worked upon with 5.0 if you save it as a WordPerfect 5.0 file. First save your document in the regular way using F7 or F10. Then press CTRL-F5 SAVE and choose WordPerfect 5.0. You will then have two copies of this file on your disk, one 5.1 version and one 5.0 version. You should work with the latter when using WordPerfect 5.0
- How do I decide which is the most appropriate font to use for my word processing document?
- The most important consideration is that your document be easy to read. It is usual to have a contrast between headings and text. The headings may be in a different typeface to the body of the text or in the same typeface but in a larger size or heavier weight. Helvetica (also known as Geneva, Helv or Swiss) is frequently used for the headings and Times-Roman (Tiempo Roman, Tms Roman or Dutch) is most often used for text.

This Headline is Set in Helvetica

point size 16, but the body of the text is set in 10 point Times-Roman (which you can see is a serif typeface)

This Headline is Set in Times Roman

with a point size 16, but the body of the text is set in 10 point Times-Roman. The main text is point 12.

A specialty typeface may be used to call attention to a message. ZaphChancery is an example of a specialty typeface obtainable on the laser printer in the ICSC.

A Happy New Year

Courier, which is the typeface which your work processor will probably choose automatically, is a fixed pitch typeface. What you see on the screen is what appears on the page. Try choosing Times-Roman next time you print a document and see the difference.
