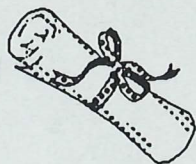

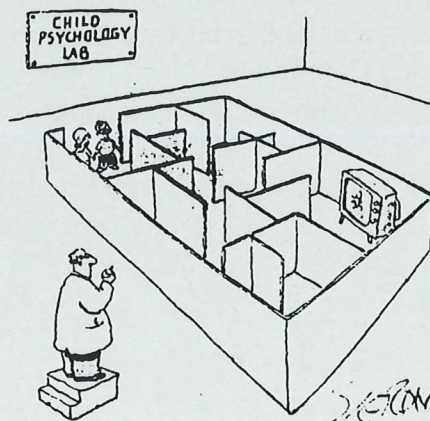

WHAT IS THE CITIZENS' FORUM ON CANADA'S FUTURE?

When the Canadian government announced the formation of The Citizens' Forum to allow Canadians the chance to have a direct impact on the country's destiny last November, there were sceptics. Here, they said, was another royal commission - another weighty volume to gather dust in the parliamentary library. They were wrong.

The Citizens' Forum was created to hold "a process of public discussion and dialogue...with and among Canadians", on a variety of specific issues. Within this mandate, the Forum was given free reign to identify the ways and means it chooses to consult with Canadians. And with that simple statement, this commission was set apart completely from all other royal commissions.

When the twelve commissioners of the Citizens' Forum met to set their own rules, they decided not to have any. Instead, they came up with some loose guidelines:

- There will be no imposing line of formally-dressed individuals, holding court in the usual hotel ballroom or in a cavernous conference centre.
- There will be no formal procedures

for Canadians to follow in order to be heard by the Commissioners.

- There will be no restricting criteria for making your views known to the Forum.
- This Commission has your name on it: The Citizens Forum on Canada's Future. The contents of the report to be submitted to all Canadians by July 1 will reflect your thoughts, your ideas, your recommendations.

The Forum hopes to thrive without borders. It's relying on Canadians to make their statement in a variety of ways.

1. **Organize a small discussion group** or ask one of the campus clubs to which you belong to devote a part of their next meeting(s) to such a discussion. The Forum can provide you with Discussion Kits and advice on how to organize such a group.
2. **Invite another group in your community or campus** to join your group in a discussion, planning and session jointly if possible. The Forum suggests that you invite a group whose experience of being Canadian is different from those in your group.
3. **Make your campus facilities available for a community meeting**, even if you can't organize such a meeting yourself. School newspapers or newsletters could be used to publicize Future of Canada discussions elsewhere on the campus.

4. **Encourage fellow students to discuss the future of Canada informally** with friends or family. It's not necessary to go to a formal meeting in order to contribute to the process.
5. **Remember this number: 1-800-663-6786 (English) or 1-800-563-6789 (French).** This is a toll-free number to ask when the Commissioners will be visiting in your area, how to contact the provincial office of the Forum, or how to order Discussion kits that contain discussion points, response forms, and other items for organizing meetings.
6. **Make your views and opinions on Canada's future known directly by:**

By participating in this discussion, you can help chart the changes that are about to take place in Canada. By talking to your family and friends, you can encourage others to make themselves heard. By taking action, you can help turn the emphasis in the current Canadian crisis from danger, to opportunity.

PREAMBLE:

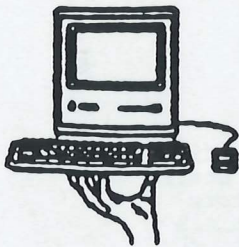
The visual identity of Vancouver Community College is important. Our students, our employees, our Board, the communities we serve, the Minister responsible for colleges, and the population generally should know immediately when they use instructional materials or see an advertisement, publication or correspondence that it is from Vancouver Community College. In addition, recipients should find the design of advertising pieces suitable to their purpose as well as visually pleasing. It is the goal of the College to convey a consistent, cohesive and quality image to our publics. The importance of achieving this goal has been underlined for the College by both institutional review teams and consultants.

POLICY:

- A. 1 The Director of Public Relations and Development is responsible for the maintenance and enhancement of the visual identity of Vancouver Community College in consultation with the President.
- A. 2 All centres and divisions of the College are responsible for ensuring that all publications including calendars, flyers, posters, brochures, newspaper ads and other advertising or promotional materials have been reviewed and approved at the design concept stage by the Director of Public Relations and Development or his/her delegate.
- A. 3 All centres and divisions initiating public relations or advertising programs which may include graphic elements, such as display, video or slide programs, are responsible for having those programs approved at the design concept stage by the Director of Public Relations and Development or his/her delegate.
- A. 4 All centres and divisions developing instructional materials shall include the college name and logo as visual identity elements.

PROCEDURES:

- B. 1 The Public Relations and Development Department shall develop, and update from time to time, guidelines for the maintenance and enhancement of the College's visual identity.
- B. 2 Communication Officers shall act on behalf of the Director of Public Relations and Development in assisting College centres to maintain and to enhance the visual identity of the College and in approving proposals and designs.
- B. 3 Communication Officers shall work with all College centres to develop communications plans periodically which include advertising and promotion programs which meet centre requirements and enhance the College's identity.
- B. 4 Proposals and concept designs for advertisements, brochures, flyers, calendars and other promotional items shall be forwarded to the appropriate Communication Officer for review and development by all College centres.
- B. 5 Instructional Media Services will assist College centres in the incorporation of visual identity elements in instructional materials.

ICSC Computing Corner

Q

How can I use my computer to obtain information and communicate with other computers?

A

Computers can communicate with each other when they are connected in some way. Two of the most usual ways that computers may be connected are by telephone lines or in a network.

To communicate by phone, each computer must be equipped with communications software and a modem

A **modem** is a piece of hardware which can be connected simultaneously to the computer and to a telephone jack. It changes computer signals to analog signals which can be transmitted over the phone lines. At the other end these signals are changed back to computer signals. In this way, a computer user can enter data on one computer and have it read by a user on another computer.

Simon Fraser University has a large computer system, Michigan Terminal System (MTS). Computer users at KEC using the ICSC or whose computers are equipped with a modem and communications software can obtain an account allowing them to use this system. They are assigned an user ID and a password. The services outlined below are then available to them.

E-Mail

Conferencing

Grolier Electronic Encyclopedia

ERIC searches

E-Mail is a messaging service. Users are assigned an electronic address on the MTS. They may send messages or receive and reply to messages from other users. They can also communicate with users registered with other computer systems such as UBC NET or the Camosun College VAX.

Conferencing The Forum Conferencing program on the MTS allows users to take part in a conference or series of discussions with colleagues using the computer as a means of conducting the conference.

Grolier Electronic Encyclopedia is an updated on-line version of the 20 volume Academic American Encyclopedia published in 1980.

ERIC Searches. ERIC is a database of educational materials collected by the Educational Resources Information Centre of the U.S. Department of Education. Users may access this database.

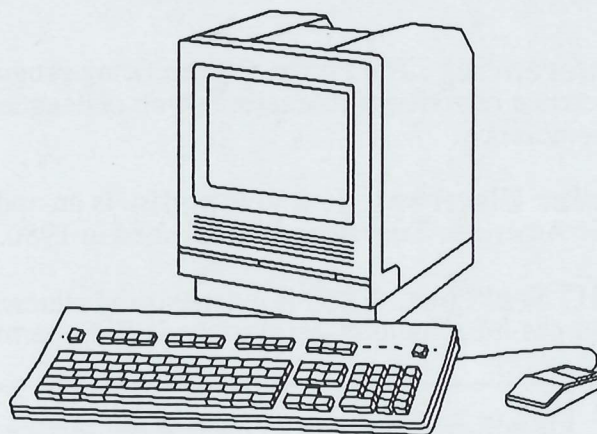

Under Milk Wood by Dylan Thomas is a before dawn to dark prowl through a Welsh seaside village. The humorous and bawdy poetry of this play for voices joyously skips and tumbles, bringing the story to life. We see Captain Cat, an ancient sea captain with his ribald memories; Polly Garter, a woman with loose habits and a pure spirit, and the compassionate parson Reverend Eli Jenkins, to name a few of the 67 eccentric characters. Under Milk Wood was originally written as a radio play and was first performed in New York City in 1953. In keeping with the initial intent this innovative production will be set in a 1950's radio studio.

After working intermittently on Under Milk Wood for ten years, Dylan Thomas completed it a month prior to his death at the age of 39. Thomas was perhaps the greatest lyric poet of this century and certainly one of the most controversial. Thomas' other works include Portrait of the Artist as a Young Dog (1940), Quite Early One Morning (1954), and A Child's Christmas in Wales.

Sherry Bie debuts as director for Studio 58 with this production of Under Milk Wood. Ms. Bie has also directed Two Weeks Twice a Year for Green Thumb Theatre, performances of the Robert Minden Ensemble and will direct Land of Trash for Green Thumb Theatre later this season. Ms. Bie worked across the country as an actor for 15 years and has taught Storytelling for both Studio 58 and the National Theatre School.

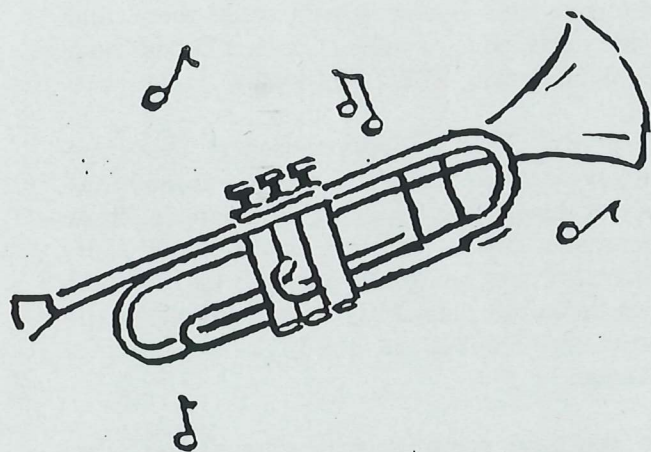

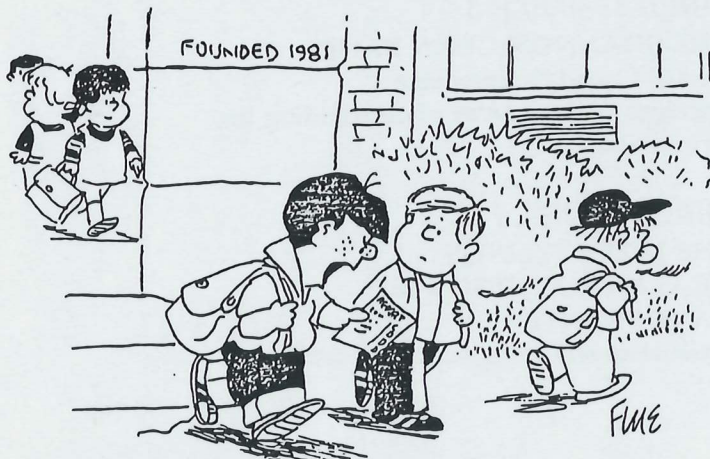

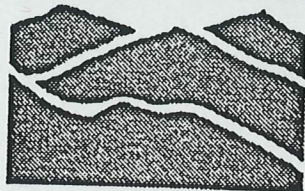
