

(GOOD LUCK IN THE YEAR OF THE RAM); AS HEALTHY AS A DRAGON AND A HORSE

Chinese New Years is the big celebration of the year for Chinese communities, even though in Canada it is but a shadow of the genuine old country celebration. Even in Hong Kong today the festivities are more subdued now that safety restrictions on fire crackers have come into effect.

The Lion Dance (from Southern China) is a custom that survives and is performed every New Year. The Dragon Dance is another version of it, from Northern China.

Chinese New year activities precede the day itself, which this year is February 15. A thorough house cleaning symbolizes a new start for the year year to come, and a willingness to discard bad habits.

On New Year's Eve people buy flowers and blossoming trees that suggest the coming of spring and a new beginning. Red paper packets containing "lucky money" are put under children's pillows, and a family dinner takes place when everyone reflects on the blessings of the past year, and looks forward to health and happiness in the New year. New Year's Day is a family day, for visiting relatives especially the elderly. Again the traditional red paper packets are given out, primarily to children as a token of good luck and prosperity. Red is a "lucky" colour. Chinese New Year cards are usually red and most people try to wear red during this festive season.

The second day is another feast day, on which often employers offer a special feast for their employees. As with most festivals, food is the focal point of Chinese New Serving fish is traditional. Fish symbolises abundance for the New Year, and must be served. The combination of duck, chicken and fish is as traditional for the Chinese feast as is turkey for Christmas in England and North America. sweet treats are seen in the stores, candied fruit is a Chinese New Year staple - winter melon, coconut and lotus seed - encased in sugar and in holiday packages. pudding or cake is usually eaten on new Year's Day.



The year 1991 is the Year of the Ram - a year of gentility, culture, elegance and artistry.

The western zodiac proceeds month by month through the year and repeats cyclically, the Chinese horoscope charts a twelve year - rather than a 12 month cycle. Each year is associated with its homesake animal and that animal's traditional characteristics.

According to legend, this horoscope was the creation of Buddha, who brought together the twelve most loyal animals in the world, and named a year after each one.

COURIER CALLS

Please ensure that the 4th Floor Switchboard Operator is advised of any courier pickups or deliveries that you have arranged or if you are expecting something to be delivered to you.

This is essential especially if the parcel is to be delivered to or picked up from somewhere other than the switchboard. Advise the operator of the name of the company you have called, or the room number and/or the contact person receiving a parcel.

The ideal handling of any couriers is to bring the package to the switchboard so that the drivers have a designated area to go to. There have been many incidents when we have been unable to locate the person or department that placed the call and the driver has had to go away empty handed.

When calling courier services please be very specific in the information you give, namely the department, office/room number and phone number.

Your cooperation in communicating detailed information to the switchboard will help to expedite your deliveries and would be appreciated by both the switchboard and the courier company involved. Thank you.

REGISTRAR'S UPDATE

Guidelines for Release of Student Information

A. Release to the Student

- 1) A student is entitled to an official transcript, but should not be given the original copy of the Permanent Student Record.
- 2) A student is entitled to inspect his or her academic record and is entitled to an explanation of any

information recorded in it.

3) Documents, letters, etc., submitted in support of an application for admission or for transfer credit should not be returned to the student or sent elsewhere except in unusual cases which should be referred to the Registrar.

B. Release to Faculty and Administrative Officers

- 1. Faculty and administrative officers who demonstrate a need to know specific information contained in a student's record may be granted access to a student's record on the authorization of the Registrar. Identification may be required.
- The official file and its contents should not be sent outside the Registrar's office. Where a faculty member or administrative officer requires the actual contents, photocopies must be made. However, only information specific to the inquiry should be sent. This may require extracting information from documents for transmittal by memo.

C. Release Regarding Public Inquiries (Including Government and Law Enforcement Agencies)

- 1. Only the following information may be released to public agencies:
 - a) enrolment status
 - b) the program in which the student is enrolled

- c) dates of enrolment
- d) certificate or diploma status

Any one requiring additional information must obtain written student authorization, a court order, or a subpoena. A court order or subpoena will usually name the Registrar, but if it does not, the document should be brought to the Registrar's attention immediately.

- 2. Addresses and telephone numbers should not be released.
- 3. Urgent requests based on apparent emergencies should be referred to the Registrar.

ENVIRONMENTAL CONCERNS

In the continuing search for ways in which we can determine the future of the environment, making it a healthier and safer place to live, what better place to start than in the home. Some suggestions follow and your ideas would be most welcome.

- When hand-washing dishes, never run water continuously. Wash dishes in a partially filled sink, then rinse them under the tap.
- If you have an automatic dishwasher, use it only to wash full loads, and use the energy saver or shortest cycle possible.
- When cleaning fruit and vegetables, never do so under a continuously running tap. Wash them in a partially filled sink, and then rinse them quickly under the tap.
- Keep a bottle of drinking water in the refrigerator, instead of running the tap until the water gets cool each time you want some.
- Wash only full loads of laundry in your

- washing machine. If your washer has an adjustable water-level indicator, set the dial to use only as much water as is really necessary.
- Use only cleaning products that will not harm the environment when they are washed away afterwards. Buy phosphate-free detergents, and avoid using bleaches and commercial fabric softeners.



Using ProComm Plus

would like to use SFU X-change for E-Mail, conferencing or conducting ERIC searches. How do I use the software in the ICSC to access SFU.

To communicate with SFU or any other computer system you must have a computer with a modem and communications software installed. In the ICSC, there is an internal modem on computer #1 and ProcommPlus is the communications software installed.


To use ProcommPlus in the ICSC, choose Computer #1

- 1. Load ProcommPlus by pressing the left mouse button to bring the menu on the screen. Move the mouse until Procomm is highlighted. Click the left button once more.
- 2. ProCommPlus will appear on the screen in large letters. Press Enter
- 3. When you are faced with a blank screen, then ProcommPlus is loaded.
- 4. Press Alt-D (Hold down the Alt key and press D) This puts you in dial mode. Since all the information for SFU is already entered on ProcommPlus, you merely move the cursor to SFU 291 4700 and press Enter.
- 5. You will hear a dialling tone, then the sound of a phone ringing, followed by an assortment of beeps and finally a CONNECT signal. If you do not make a connection, Procomm will keep dialling until you do. To interrupt at any time, press the ESC key.
- 6. When the connection is made, you will be faced again with a blank screen except for the message *ProcommPlus on line to SFU* across the top.
- 7. From here, follow the instructions in the SFU X-Change booklet which will come with your User ID.
- 8. To obtain a printed copy of what appears on the screed, press Alt-L. To cancel, press Alt-L again.

If you are using ProcommPlus on another computer with an external modem, make sure that the odem is turned on and connected to the phone jack, then follow the directions for loading ProcommPlus and Press Alt-D to enter dial mode.

Once in dial mode, follow these instructions:

- 1. Press R
- 2. Type SFU (Enter)
- 3. Type 2914700 (Enter)
- 4. A list of choices will appear on the screen. Move the cursor to 1200 (Enter)
- 5. Move the cursor to NONE (Enter)
- 6. Choose these options 8 1 Full X Modem ANSI
- 6. Press Enter three times.
- 7. Proceed as above.


