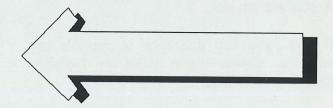

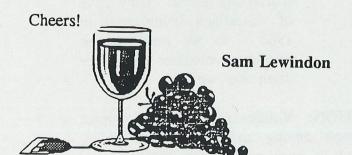
KING EDWARD CAMPUS FERMENTATION SOCIETY

VOLUNTEER WORK WORTH BILLIONS

The value of volunteer work performed in Canada is estimated to be \$12 billion, according to a newly released report on the Economic Dimensions of Volunteer Work In Canada using data from the 1987 Survey of Volunteer Activity.

Over a 12-month period in 1986/87, an estimated 5.3 million Canadians performed an average of 191 hours each of volunteer time. Using an average service sector wage these 1.108 billion hours are estimated to be

worth \$13.2 billion in 1990 dollars! If converted to full-time positions, this would amount to 617,000 jobs, equivalent to 6 percent of all full-time jobs in the Canadian labour force in 1987.

The report highlighted a number of other interesting FACTS and FICTIONS regarding volunteerism in Canada. You may be surprised by the following:

FICTION: Charitable and non-profit programs or causes probably have trouble recruiting volunteers because most of us feel we simply don't have the time. And besides, it probably takes asking five people to get one volunteer.

- FACT: © 44% of Canadians said that they are likely to use their spare time to volunteer (1986/87).
 - © Of the 62% of us who have ever been asked to volunteer, 85% did so. And 92% found their experience to be satisfying (1986/87).
 - Almost half of all Canadians who have never volunteered say they are likely to volunteer if they are asked! Only 27% of Canadians volunteered in 1986 so we need to ask people to volunteer a lot more often than we are!

FICTION: Volunteering is probably most common among those who are young enough to enjoy relative freedom from the demands of jobs and families, or those who, now retired, enjoy similar freedoms along

with more leisure time.

FACT: Those who are under 30 and over 60 years of age volunteer significantly less than those between the ages of 30 and 60.

FICTION: Corporate leaders don't want to give their company profits to non-profit activities.

- FACT: © 90% of Canada's largest companies say that supporting charitable organizations is an important responsibility, unrelated to the taxes they already pay.
 - When asked how much companies should be giving to charitable causes, half the companies surveyed agreed that donating 1% of pre-tax average profits is "about right or too low"!
 - As well, 84% of large companies support the idea of actively encouraging employee voluntarism.

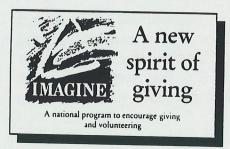
FICTION: Charitable activity in Canada is entirely unregulated, leading to a lot of fraudulent activity.

FACT: The Income Tax Act provides that every charity must file an annual information return providing details of the gifts for which charitable donation receipts have been issued, and an

audited financial statement for the fiscal year. Regulations are in place to ensure that not more than 20% of receipted donations are spent on "administrative costs, including fundraising". Portions of the charities' information return are available for public scrutiny.

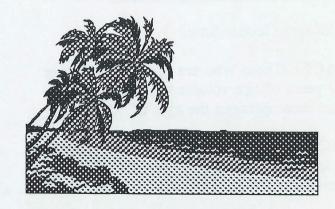

Low Cost Printers

ICSC Computing Corner

Q: I would like to buy a printer for my computer, but cannot afford a Laser printer. What is available to me at a lower price?

A: In the lower price categories you can choose between the dot-matrix, or ink jet printers. A third type, daisy wheel printers are not much in evidence at the moment.

Dot Matrix

printers are relatively inexpensive, easy to maintain and quite adequate for essays, letters and reports. They usually come with a limited number of fixed pitch typefaces, and point sizes in Regular, *Italic*, Bold or *Bold Italic*. A wider variety of fonts may, however, be made available (more on that topic next week.)

Characters

are imprinted by a printhead striking against the page and so dot-matrix printers are noisy. The printhead is composed of a matrix of nine or twenty four pins, and characters are composed of a number of tiny dots formed by the pins on the paper. The twenty four pin printer places the dots closer together, so resolution is better and the characters are crisper and more clear than with the nine pin variety. The twenty four pin is also faster. Costing roughly \$340.00, they are usually about twice the price of the nine pin printers.

Print Modes

There are two print modes available, draft and near letter quality. The former is fast and should produce about 150-200 characters per second since the printhead passes over the line only once. When proofreading is complete, the user may switch to near letter quality where the printhead passes over the line of print a second time filling in some of the spaces between the dots, so characters are darker, firmer and more pleasing to the eye. This mode is slower than draft.

Graphics

If you are considering graphics, your dot matrix printer should emulate (be able to behave like) an Epson printer, since the Epson works with most graphic packages.

Upkeep

These printers are sturdy and usually the only upkeep cost is the replacement of the printer ribbon cartridge, ranging from \$10.00 to \$20.00.

Ink-Jet

printers form the characters by squirting ink on the paper. At a cost of \$500.00 to \$800.00, the ink-jet is sometimes referred to as the poor man's laser printer. These printers are quiet, and fast, compact and portable. Print quality is good, ranging about half way between that of the dot matrix and the laser printer. Colour ink jet printers may be purchased for about \$1500.00.

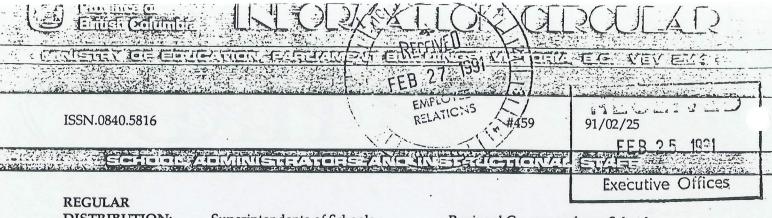
