UPDATE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

1. Recreation Centre

I am pleased to report that we discussed this project with Ministry officials on March 6 and showed them the tentative plans.

They indicated that a letter would be forthcoming to describe the manner in which the Ministry would participate in some pattern of cost-sharing.

2. The Semester System

I presented to the President our joint recommendations for a semester system but he replied on March 11 to say he cannot approve. In his letter he says:

"I have received from you a recommendation to approve a semester system at King Edward Campus. After having reviewed the financial implications of the recommendation, I must advise you that I cannot approve the recommended system on behalf of the College Board nor recommend it to the Board for Board approval. I say this

because the recommended system would not allow us to meet our 1991-92 FTE targets within the funding anticipated for that year; as you know, we have been advised that the funding formula for 1991-92 will not change for most "vocationally-funded programs".

I have forwarded more information to your Division Chairs and Department Heads who will be discussing further with you how we can move towards the semester system on campus.

3. Notable Event

It has been a pleasure to watch the Music Department prepare for the fund-raising Notable Event on March 21. To date 38 tables at \$1,000 have been sold for this dinner and concert. Congratulations!

4. Anonymous Letters

It has been brought to my attention that some instructors have received in their campus mailboxes anonymous letters containing nasty and malicious personal comments. These are presented as if written by colleagues!

ST. PATRICK'S DAY - MARCH 17

Who was St. Patrick? He is the patron saint of Ireland, born either in England or Scotland, and he brought the Christian religion to the Emerald Isle, probably during the first half of the fifth century.



Saint Patrick was captured by pirates from Ireland at the age of 16 and was taken back there where he spent the next six years herding swine. During this period of captivity Patrick became a devoted Christian. He escaped to France and became a monk. In 432, a vision led him to return to Ireland as a missionary.

At the age of forty, Patrick was made a bishop.

For 30 to 40 years, he worked in Ireland. He founded over 300 churches and baptised

more than 120,000 persons. There are many legends surrounding Saint Patrick. He used the Shamrock to demonstrate the Holy Trinity, the Three in One and One in Three. He is said to have charmed the snakes of Ireland down to the seashore so that they were driven into the water and drowned.

Irish people throughout the world celebrate St. Patrick's Day on March 17 which was the date on which he died and after which Ireland mourned for twelve days.

Adding Printer Fonts

ICSC Computing Corner

Q I have purchased a printer and am dissatisfied with the fonts available. How may I add more fonts?

A Additional fonts may be purchased on disk or in a cartridge. Disk based fonts may be soft fonts or on-the-fly fonts.

Soft Fonts

Downloading Fonts

may be purchased on disk and installed on your computer's hard drive following the manufacturer's instructions. *These fonts may be permanently downloaded or temporarily downloaded*, following instructions.

Downloading fonts means that copies of the fonts are sent from the hard drive and stored in the printer's memory. Permanent, refers only to a work session. *Permanently downloaded fonts remain in the printer's memory only until the power is turned off.* These fonts are generally used for the body of the text, usually in smaller sizes 10, 12 or 14 points. Temporarily downloaded fonts, like headlines or decorative fonts, are sent to the printer's memory *only while a publication is being printed.*

Automatic Downloading

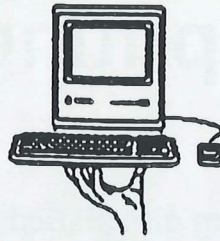
Use a batch file or instructions in your autoexec.bat file to automatically download fonts at the start of a work session. If you use this method, make sure that your printer is turned on *before* you turn on your computer so that the printer accepts the downloaded fonts.

Cartridges

A selection of fonts is available on hardware cartridges which may be plugged in to your printer, if it accepts cartridges. There are a variety of cartridges available for different needs. You may purchase fonts specifically for your applications: a WordPerfect for WordPerfect documents, a Microsoft cartridge for Word, Excel or Windows, a cartridge for technical documents or for wordprocessing in other languages. You may also purchase a Postscript cartridge which will allow you to use scalable fonts-meaning virtually any size of font-but, remember that you will then have to upgrade the printer's memory to two megabytes.

Fonts-on-the-Fly

Scalable fonts, meaning fonts in almost any size, are available in special packs. They may be disk-based, and can be installed on your hard disk. They do not need to be downloaded into the printer's memory, but are available when the document is being printed-*on the fly*. This means that the printer memory is not cluttered up with fonts. These packs may also be used with a dot matrix printer for any windows application.



PRIMROSE SCHOOL DISTRICT 109 by Ted Galay is set in a small Ukrainian farm town in Manitoba during the 1930's. This tightly woven community is thrown into turmoil when Rose Brenowski, fresh from teacher's training, is hired as the new schoolteacher. She is full of idealism and ambition and sets out to inspire her students with the possibilities the world offers. Her good intentions run contrary to the traditional values of the townspeople who, feeling threatened, fear their enlightened children will leave the town. When Rose decides to marry and have children of her own she must personally face the very controversy she's sparked.

This timeless and engaging story of how change affects our lives and the choices we make is depicted with warmth, humour and a piercing realism.

PRIMROSE SCHOOL DISTRICT 109 was originally workshopped at the New Play Centre under the direction of Pamela Hawthorn and has subsequently been produced at the Blyth Festival, Prairie Theatre Exchange and Fraser Valley College. Ted Galay has written several other plays including *After Baba's Funeral/Sweet and Sour Pickles*, (winner of 1981 Drama Award from Canadian Authors Association), *Tsymbaly* (winner of 1985 Jessie Award for best new play) and *Tonight...Plaf* with Joelle Rabu. When Ted Galay is not writing plays he teaches Math for Vancouver Community College, Langara Campus.

Kathleen Weiss returns to STUDIO 58 as Director for **PRIMROSE SCHOOL DISTRICT 109**, having directed last season's production of *Our Town*. Ms. Weiss has directed several plays over the last year including *Powder Blue Chevy*, a Tamahnous Theatre/ Firehall Theatre co-production, *Malefica* for Theatre Energy and *The Invisible Detective* for Touchstone Theatre.

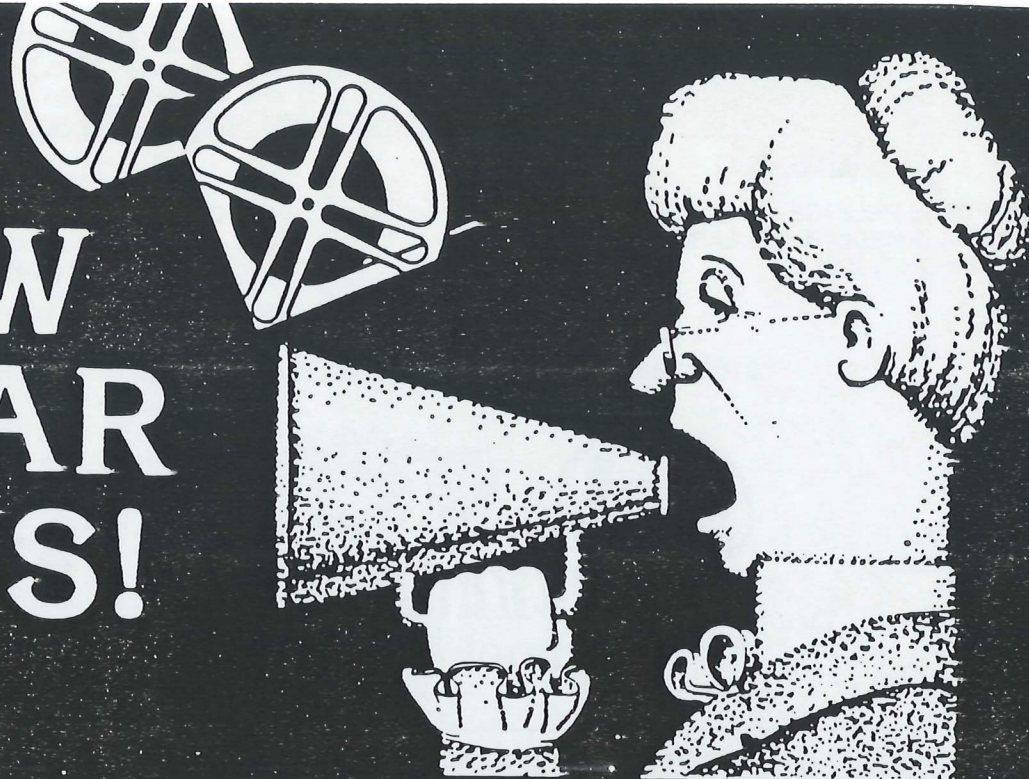

JAPANESE LANGUAGE TEACHER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

As part of the Pacific 2000 strategy to enhance Asian linguistic capabilities in Canada, the Asia Pacific Foundation of Canada is pleased to announce the establishment of a Japanese Language Teacher Assistance program.

The program is designed to assist in recruiting qualified teachers of Japanese as a Second Language in Canada. The Foundation will take a shared approach with interested institutions to provide for a limited number of teachers to be recruited from Japan for up to a 2 year period. Eligible recipients would be secondary and post secondary educational institutions across Canada.

The Foundation will administer the program in accordance with the following eligibility criteria:

1. Funding will be eligible for expenses associated with recruitment, travel, relocation and short-term English or orientation training if required. Salaries will be paid by the host institution.
2. Institutions will be asked to demonstrate counterpart or matching funding in order to qualify for support. This must be from a source other than the federal government such as the private sector and/or provincial governments. Salaries paid to the teacher will be deemed counterpart funding.
3. Proposals should discuss the following:
 - (i) Review of local practices with respect to hiring native Japanese language speakers eg. professional certification requirements, proficiency levels etc., (ii) analysis of current and future demand for Japanese language courses, (iii) alternative sources of teachers considered, (iv) length of assignment for which the proposal applies, (v) expected teaching load (hours of work per week, size of class, evening or day classes, etc.), (vi) orientation, homestay and other support services offered (if any).
4. Budget analysis should indicate the following:
 - (i) Total cost of the project, (ii) breakdown of expenditures including teacher salaries, recruitment costs, travel expenses and other associated costs, (iii) compensation package for the teacher, (iv) source of matching/counterpart funding.
5. Proposals should be submitted to the Foundation by May 30, 1991. Priority will be given to those institutions who demonstrate a strong commitment to Asia Pacific education and Japanese language training through current or future program initiatives.
6. It should be noted that funds available under this program are limited.
