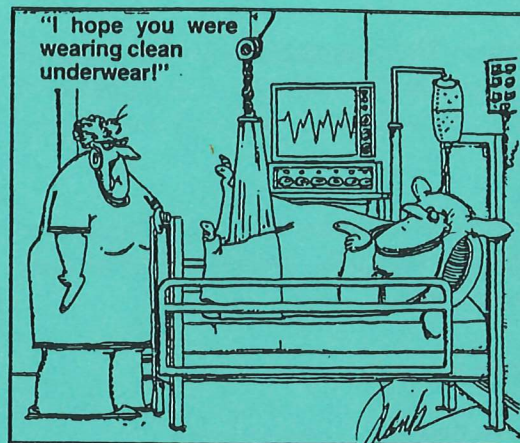
CENSUS CANADA UPDATE

WHAT IS ALL CAMPUS COUNCIL?

According to **The Constitution and By Laws of the All Campus Council**, the main purposes of our All Campus Council, which is an advisory body, are:

1. To provide a forum for all members to participate as equals without regard to their role on Campus
2. To take a proactive role in:
 - i) facilitating communication
 - ii) initiating discussion
 - iii) providing advice and recommendations on Campus matters.

The All Campus Council was established in 1987 to provide a forum where views from all areas of the Campus (Instructional Divisions and Student Services, students, staff and administration) would be represented and discussed.

Voting members represent these areas, according to the relative size in numbers, as follows:

English as a Second Language Division	14
Adult Basic Education Division	8
Career Division	6
Student Services	3
Students	4
Staff	4

Non-voting members include three Campus administrators and one Division Chair.

The Council is comprised of 43 members to give adequate representation to all sectors of the Campus. All members have equal status, regardless of their role on campus. The pioneer Chairperson, Cheryl Draper worked hard to establish the Council and made a significant contribution to improve communication on

Campus. Margaret MacKenzie who succeeded Cheryl in December 1990, will continue to pursue the identified concerns of the Campus currently including Campus safety and security, the needs of students with disabilities and the beautification of the Campus. The ACC believes however that in order for the Council to function most effectively, your views must be communicated to your Council representatives. We have listed ACC membership. If you have concerns or suggestions please talk to your area representatives to ensure a fair hearing and action.

ICSC COMPUTING CORNER

Using Your Modem

Q: Do I need to have an ID to use my modem?

A: No, even if you do not have a user ID at SFU or other system, you may still use your modem to connect with a number of services. One of these is Vancouver Public Library. From your computer, you can access the following information:

- Titles in the collection
- Which branches hold a copy of each title
- Your own borrower-status (If you have a VPL Library card)
- Library hours and programs
- Community Organizations

Getting Connected:

1. Load your communications software- ProcommPlus, MS Works, Windows Terminal etc.
2. See side column for setup information.
3. Enter the telephone number 665-5010
4. Wait until you are connected. You will get a CONNECT message when this happens

Wait up to ten seconds
5. You will be asked to enter the type of terminal you are emulating. You should choose either ANSI or VT100 depending which of these you entered in your setup. Select the correct number from the list on the screen.
6. A test screen will then zap past. You will be asked if you can read it. Type Y [Enter] if you can do so.
7. You will then be connected and may use your computer as you would a terminal at the library.
8. From now on you type the number of your choice and proceed as if you were using a terminal in the KEC library or in a branch of the Public Library. Type 1 to search for a particular title, 2 for a title keyword, 9 to check your borrower status and so on.

At this time you cannot place holds from home.

ProComm is available from the Science and Technology Division of the Vancouver Public Library Central Branch.. Bring a formatted floppy disk and you may copy the program onto it. Since this is a Shareware program, you should comply with any instructions before you use it. (Shareware programs normally request a registration fee.)

You will be required to give the following information to your communications program, before you dial the library. (If you are not sure how to do this, contact Stephen at Local 556 or me at Local 776)

- Full duplex
- 8 data bits
- 1 stop bit
- no parity
- baud rate up to 2400
- terminal emulation:
ANSI or VT100

When you have finished the library search, do not forget to LOG OFF
