WHY A CENSUS?

Local governments as well as federal government need census information in order to plan ahead. Using census data in government planning processes ensures the greatest benefit to all Canadian residents for the tax dollars spent.

Census data are used in the calculation of the amount of federal government transfer payments to the provinces. Every person missed on Census Day costs the province approximately \$600 per person per year. Every person counted generates funds through provincial per capita grants, which in turn enables municipal councils to provide essential services to the community.

The Census on June 4, 1991 will provide a "snapshot" of the living conditions and make up of the population of every community in Canada. This information affords local governments and businesses a profile of their community, and a base for growth projections for the planning of required health, education, recreation, transportation and public protection services. Accurate data provide a forecasting tool for the future demand for government provided services. New businesses are encouraged into areas, based on census data. This in turn provides jobs, stimulates the

economy and contributes tax dollars to our government coffers for the provision of improved services.

Census forms are strictly confidential. They are seen only by those who are sworn to secrecy under the Statistics Act and who actually need to see them. Statistics Canada is only interested in the patterns that emerge from the combined answers of every household in Canada. It is impossible to identify you as an individual when the census data are published.

Your participation in the Census is essential. It directly affects the quality of life in the country, in the province and in our local communities. If you do not count yourself in, money is lost to the province for five years - until the next Census. It is important to stand up and be counted!

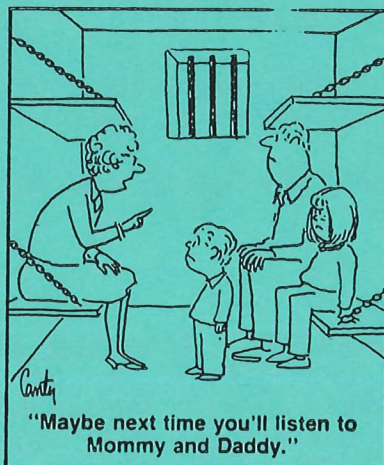

Part-time and full-time KEC students who:

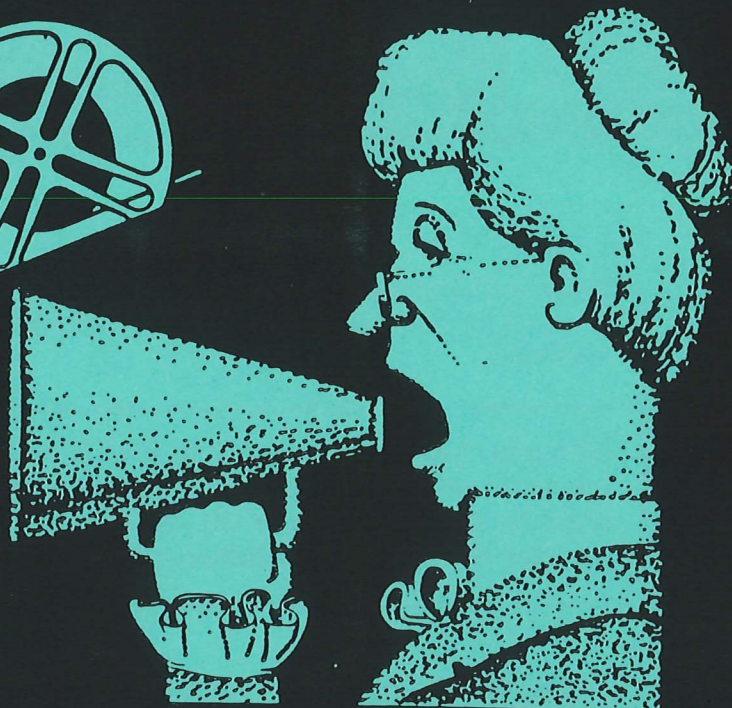
- are registered in courses during the Summer 1991 term at KEC; (May to August 1991)

ICSC COMPUTING CORNER

Finding an E-Mail Address

Q : How will I know if a person to whom I want to send an E-mail message has an E-mail address?

A: There is only one sure way to find if a person has an E-mail address so that you can send e-mail messages to him or her, and that is to contact the person by phone or mail and ask.

Once you have established that there is an E-mail address, you can find out what it is. Apart from user directories, discussed below, that is the only reliable way to obtain a person's e-mail address.

User Directories

Some organizations publish directories of e-mail addresses for the people belonging to the organization. A British Columbia Colleges and Institutes Electronic Mail Directory has been compiled by Wesley Cole of Cariboo College. The names are listed in alphabetical order along with the e-mail addresses. Here is an example of an entry in this directory.

jwilliams@fvc.ca

This translates to:

J. Williams at Fraser Valley College on the Canadian network

There is a copy of this directory in the ICSC. Glance through it next time you are there and check if anyone you know has an e-mail address.

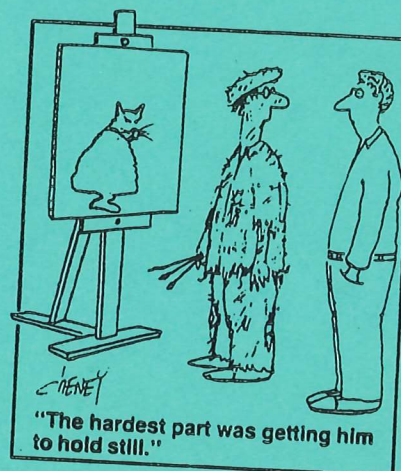
