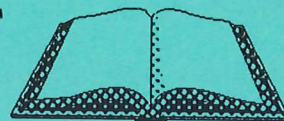

Who Are We?

Women in Post-Secondary Education in BC is a new registered non-profit organization. Our goals are to:

- Promote equity of opportunity and excellence in leadership for women in post-secondary education in BC;
- Provide information, support, and encouragement to women to take leadership roles in post-secondary education;
- Advocate for women to obtain leadership positions in post-secondary education;
- Identify and support women in leadership positions to serve as role models for other women aspiring to leadership roles;
- Support initiatives that further the goals of the Society.

Two years ago a group of women started meeting together for networking and professional development. At around the same time, the May 1990 "Goals for Women in the College system" conference inspired women to form a group advocating for women to become leaders in post-secondary education. Our new

organization sprang from the initiatives taken by the women in these two groups.

Membership

Membership is open to all women interested in the advancement of women in post-secondary education in British Columbia. The yearly fee for an individual membership is \$25.00.

Institutional memberships are available as well. Annual fees depend upon the size of the institution: Small, \$100; Medium, \$200; Large, \$300.00. Institutional members are not entitled to a vote. The institutional membership is a show of support for the core activities of our organization. ICSC COMPUTING CORNER

Communications Software

Q: Why do I need Communications Software as well as a modem in order to communicate from one computer to another.

A: When information is sent from one computer to another there are rules governing how it is sent and received. It is important that the computer sending the information obeys the same set of rules as the computer which is receiving it. Otherwise they would not understand each other.

The computer needs the communications software to organize the way in which it sends and receives information..

Protocol

The set of rules which are used for sending and receiving information and for picking up any errors that occur as it is being sent is called a protocol.

There are a number of different protocols.

XMODEM is the name given to one of the most commonly used protocols

Some other protocols are YMODEM, ZMODEM, KERMIT. These may be used for sending longer files or for transmitting data more quickly.

Terminal Emulation

A microcomputer which is communicating with a large computer system behaves like a terminal. The large computer system needs to know what type of terminal the microcomputer is emulating or behaving like.

The two most common terminal emulations are VT100 and ANSI.

SFU X-Change

When you become a member of SFU X-Change or other system, you will be sent the information which the computer system needs so that your computer and the larger system can communicate with each other

- baud rate(bits per second)
- protocol
- number of stop bits
- parity
- number of data bits

Your communications software allows you to enter this information into your computer.

This is an exciting and challenging opportunity to coordinate the overall direction, development, delivery and evaluation of Health programs and resources in British Columbia. The position will commence in September, 1991, with a one year appointment, possibly renewable for a second year.

The Coordinator of Health Programs is responsible for all health-related programs in the colleges and institutes throughout the Province, and includes some involvement with programs in the universities. In this position, the Coordinator will assess training needs and ensure the relevance of training to current health care needs. The position includes liaising closely with the Ministry of Health, professional associations (RNABC, Council of LPN, Board of Dental Technicians, etc.) and other agencies involved in the provision of health care in British Columbia.

Responsibilities of the Coordinator will also include reviewing institutional program proposals, and addressing curriculum development needs and evaluating existing programs.

The overall budget for Health Programs in the colleges and institutes is \$35,000,000 to meet the training and support service needs of 4,200 FTE students.

If this position is filled by a secondment from a post-secondary institution, the incumbent will continue at his/her current classification and pay rate. To assist the incumbent to relocate to Victoria, moving expenses on a graduated scale are provided. The vacation entitlement for the position is four weeks but the successful applicant will be compensated for any lost vacation time which exceeds four weeks.

If this position is filled via a personal services contract, the terms of the contract will be negotiable between the Ministry and the incumbent.

QUALIFICATIONS

Post-secondary degree in an appropriate discipline plus considerable experience in a related field; some knowledge of instructional and curriculum design and development; tact; maturity; good judgement; excellent communication skills; analytical and evaluation skills; an ability to evaluate projects objectively.

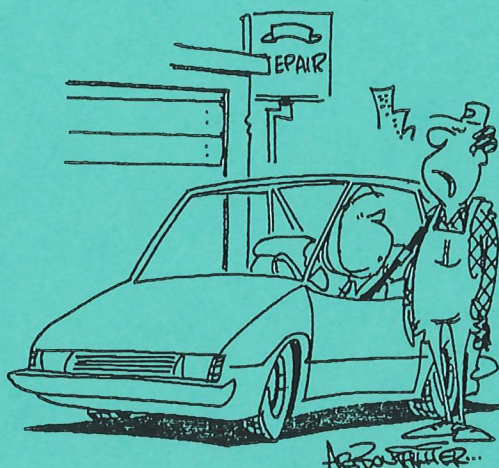
