KEC DISABLED STUDENTS MEETING

What a Turn Out!

March 11 was the first meeting of the disabled students as a group, but we do not want to forget all the faculty members, staff and able bodies that attended. We had put up posters for about two weeks prior to the meeting and asked people to leave their name and phone number at the Student Action Council Office if they were interested in coming to the meeting. A few days before the meeting we had only four names and not a very good response from some of the people we had asked verbally. The day of the

meeting came and we had able bodied students helping disabled students to the meeting, we had the cafeteria bring coffee, and I personally couldn't keep track of all the other people trying to get in the room to see what the meeting was all about. The meeting room we had could only seat thirty people, but from the list of people who attended we had 48 different disabled students show up, and several different departments of the Campus attend which included administration, student counsellors, different program instructors (Visually Impaired, Hearing Impaired, IEPA, etc.) and the Student Action Council. There were also organizations that are networked to the Campus such as BCEADS (British Columbia Educational Association of Disabled Students), (Vocational Rehabilitation Services), etc.

What is the Group?

I think most people were interested in knowing what kind of group we are starting and what our objectives are, but we made sure that everyone left with a greater understanding of what the group is going to be all about. Two key words to describe the group would be **COMMUNICATION AND COOPERATION**. We think the first meeting covered both of these areas because we had **communication** between different disabilities and able bodies, but we also had **cooperation** because some of the disabled people would not even have made it to the meeting if it were not for the able bodied

people. To develop the communication and cooperation we are organizing committees in the areas of awareness, access, activities, and newsletter writing. We would like these committees to be mixed or multi-disabled. This means that each committee would be comprised of several different disabilities and each committee would pick one person to head that committee. We felt that a multi-disabled committee will allow all disabilities to come together and learn how to communicate with each other, how to work together, and how to communicate as one group to the administration, faculty, staff, and other groups involved with the College. We would like to have an advisory committee comprised of the committee heads and administration, teachers, counsellors, and any other departments of the College. We already have a great college to attend, but let's communicate and cooperate to make KEC that much more enjoyable for all of us.

LEARNING CENTRE NEWS

This week we profile the Learning Centre staff members:

KAREN JANE HILL, an English/Humanities tutor, has tutored privately for a number of years to students of differing levels and backgrounds. She is skilled at identifying problem areas and finding appropriate means of assistance, which are often unique to the particular student. She has a love for the English language and all its idiosyncrasies, and a love for the earth's people (and all their idiosyncrasies!). Karen has a keen interest in multiculturalism, and fostering understanding between people in all areas. Karen's students could testify that learning can be fun, as well as meaningful.

KATIE RODGERS, an English/Humanities tutor, is a BC certified teacher and is currently enroled in VCC's TESL program. She had taught ESL (and skiing) in Japan for 3 years before returning to Vancouver.

MICHAEL DANIEL, a tutor of English, ESL and French, graduated from UBC with EDUCATION 478 and a degree in the French Language. He has taken several TESL courses at KEC. His special interests in ESL are listening and speaking, music and theatre in ESL, and ways of helping our students increase their exposure to native speakers.

GORDON WONG, a Math/Science tutor, tutors students with mathematics, physics and chemistry. He asks more of each student, hoping that each student will, in turn, ask more of himself/herself. He stresses techniques that will make students think and find, in themselves, solutions that they did not know could exist. At the same time, he encourages students to be the best that they can be and not to worry about being better than someone else.

TOM MCDIARMID, a Math/Science tutor, tutors students with mathematics, physics and chemistry. His patient approach has been welcomed with open arms by many students. He has also supplemented his own education with a variety of advanced mathematics and physics courses.

MARK DAVIE, a clerk at the Learning Centre handles a majority of the Learning Centre publicity pertaining to the workshops. His handiwork can be seen around campus on the various Learning Centre boards.


