TEACHER DIRECTED CLASSROOM RESEARCH WORKSHOP

WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 28, 1991

(Co-Sponsored By: The Centre for Curriculum and Professional Development, Capilano College and Vancouver Community College)

Since 1986 K. Patricia Cross and Tom Angelo have written and spoken to college teachers and administrators throughout North America about a simple approach to improving the quality of college teaching and learning. **TEACHER DIRECTED CLASSROOM RESEARCH** is

the approach they have developed to improve the effectiveness of higher education where it matters most - in the classroom.

What is Teacher Directed Classroom Research?

The purpose of Classroom Research is to improve the quality of learning in college classrooms. The program helps college teachers to obtain useful feedback on how much and how well their students are learning what they are trying to teach.

As faculty members practice Classroom Assessment Techniques, they become better able to understand and encourage learning. They also increase their ability to help students become more effective, responsible, and self-directed learners. In other words, Classroom Assessment Techniques empower both teachers and students to improve the quality of teaching.

Who is the Workshop Facilitator?

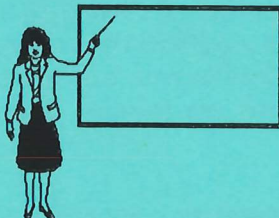
Dr. Thomas Anthony Angelo is Director of the Centre for Faculty Development at California State University, Long Beach, where he also teaches Political Science. From 1988 to 1990 he was Assistant Director of the Classroom Research Project and a lecturer in Higher Education in the Graduate School of Education at UC-Berkeley. Prior to moving to Berkeley, he was Assistant Director of Harvard

University's Seminar on Assessment. He received his doctorate from the Harvard Graduate School of Education where he concentrated on applied linguistics, program evaluation and assessment. He is co-author, with K. Patricia Cross, of **Classroom Assessment Techniques: A Handbook for Faculty**.

The teleconference workshop will be held at Langara on Wednesday, August 28, 1991 from 8:45 a.m. - 12:30 p.m. It is hoped that an audio conference with the presenters in California can be arranged for an afternoon session.

FOLLOW UP: HEARING AWARENESS WEEK

"I felt very vulnerable because I couldn't trust my communications skills."

"At first I found it peaceful... But.. I ended by feeling lonely and isolated..."

"Apparently I spoke more softly with the ear plugs in; it's probably because I felt that I was yelling in my own ears. It is not an experience I want to repeat."

"Where I had not heard what somebody said, I would go on to perform familiar tasks... could definitely cause further embarrassment..."

"When people learnt that I could not hear they would walk away from me."

From the responses received on what it felt like to be hard of hearing for half an hour, reactions ranged from finding the experience "nauseating" -- loss of hearing can affect one's balance and thus can cause dizziness -- to dangerous, confusing, feeling vulnerable, disorienting, and all the way to peaceful.

It has been said that until one has walked a mile in another's shoes, it is difficult to truly understand the latter's perspective. For the 50 some odd people who participated in "Trading Places" where they had to be "hard of hearing" for half an hour, it was a mind opening

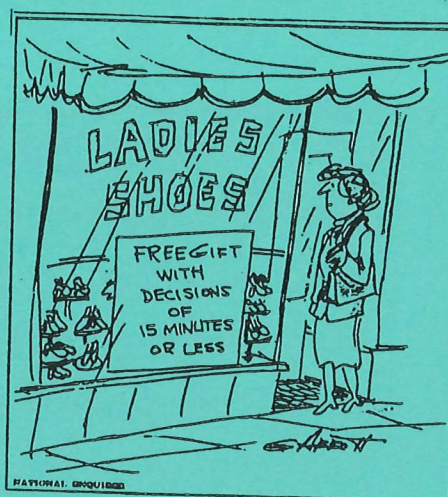
NEW YORK TIMES BOOK CLUB

Roles and Responsibilities

The Co-ordinator will be posted in Beijing in the CCCLP office to work in close partnership with staff of the Chinese Educational Association for International Exchange (CEAIE), the Chinese counterpart on the programme.

Reporting to the Regional Director, Asia & Middle East Division or his designate, the co-ordinator will:

1. Ensure the smooth and effective functioning of the programme in administrative and financial systems, procedures, communications, infrastructure, etc.
2. Facilitate effective co-ordination of in-China and in-Canada administration and programme activities, keeping in focus the objectives of ACCC and the programme.
3. Act as liaison/resource person to CEAIE on subjects relating to ACCC, Canadian colleges and Canadian education system.
4. Participate in in-China activities such as orientation of Canadian cooperants, orientation of departing Chinese cooperants, workshops/seminars, CEAIE Advisory Committee meetings, problem solving, liaison with provincial education authorities, public relations with Canadian visitors where necessary.
5. Assist in planning, organization and implementation of Canadian inputs into national/regional outreach activities, especially in-China workshops and seminars.
6. Monitor programme funds and assist in the preparation of financial and progress reports.
7. Assist in the compiling, editing and/or translation of newsletters and other publications relating to the programme.
8. Assess the efficiency and effectiveness of programme/project implementation and make recommendations to the Regional Director.

Required Qualification and experience

- * Graduate from either a University or College with formal administrative training
- * Be knowledgeable with the Canadian community college/institute management system and has an understanding of the developmental assistance goals and objectives of the Government of Canada
- * Demonstrated experience in management and administration. Able to organize workload, work with minimum supervision, and function under often difficult working conditions. Able to sustain work pressure and attend to detail.
