Vice Principal Patricia Groves leaves us at the end of this month for Toronto's George Brown College. The position of Academic Vice President was offered to Patricia as the unanimous choice of the search committee. In the following interview, Patricia tells us why she has chosen to leave VCC.

You have been head-hunted many times before, why have you only now decided to accept a job offer?

In order to keep contributing, one must keep learning - certainly in a new college system in another part of the country, the learning curve will accelerate. As Administrators, I believe we belong not as much to ourselves or a particular institution as we do to the cause of Education and therefore should be prepared to be on call to serve when the time comes, even if it is far from home.

Can you tell us about your position at George Brown?

The title is Vice President, Academic but it does not mean "academic" in the usual sense. In our terms, it means "Instruction". The Ontario Colleges do not have University Transfer programs - but rather technical and vocational programs like BCIT and like King Edward and City Centre. As Vice President, Academic, I

will be responsible for all of the college's Instructional programs, including those in continuing education on a decentralised model. except for programs in Access, Contract Services and such areas. George Brown has four major campuses, but no campus administrations, and so I will work in central administration along with a V.P. Finance and a V.P. Access & Community Services, reporting directly to the President. There are six deans covering the various programs in the instructional divisions for which am responsible. Together we will form the instructional management team working with several Division Chairs and Coordinators.

How do you feel about leaving VCC and Vancouver?

I did not seek to leave VCC, and responded to the invitation to meet the George Brown consultant, at first, only as a courtesy and exploration. However during the process, because George Brown has many similarities to King Edward and City Centre including a



multicultural student population and because of the immediate rapport I felt with the people I met from George Brown, I became genuinely interested. It was not an easy decision to leave an institution to which I feel tremendously attached and especially to leave the people with whom I work closely and toward whom I feel a very strong collegial bond - not to mention my home and the city I have enjoyed for the past 27 years.

At the same time, I grew up in Ontario, my family is there, my daughter hopes to work in Ottawa, and I have many friends and colleagues in the Ontario College System including a few who have come from B.C. It is very difficult to make a big change in one's life, especially when one is no longer young, but at the same time, change is stimulating and productive. In short, I am very sad to leave VCC and the west coast, but I am looking forward to new challenges in my old home.

What do you feel have been your major accomplishments at VCC?

The instructional management team had a retreat several months ago in which each of us was asked privately what he or she felt best about, and each of us replied "the team". We have over time built a cohesive, cooperative, mutually supportive team on the "Fourth Floor". There is genuine caring for each other and there is also a dedicated commitment to serve the campus together and to take the College forward.

What I have enjoyed the most are the creative ideas that have emerged from meetings with faculty and staff to solve problems that could have been depressing. For example, the Music Fundraising campaign started with a request for tuition fee waivers for students in the classic program and some despair over our competitive position. The Action Plans for ESL and ABE emerged in similar ways. Equally valuable is

the work in supporting people with good ideas the Campus Enhancement Committee which resulted in that wonderful student architecture plan for humanizing the campus with a warm aesthetic, Jim Funk's inter-campus transportation passion, the Learning Centre project and so on.

The Curriculum Development Committee and the PD TAR Committee, thanks to the work and commitment of faculty, have enhanced the professional standing of the campus. A portfolio that gave equal status to Student Services (Dean of Instruction and Student Services) allowed for better support of Instruction, a more functional administration and an improvement of morale in student services. This position was unique in the province and very rewarding to operationalise.

What will you miss most about VCC?

I will miss the people, especially those with whom I worked directly and I will miss what I have called KEC's heart - best expressed in the relationship between instructor and student with caring above and beyond the requirements of the teaching/learning situation.

Some people have asked if my decision is related to the hard times that VCC has recently experienced and I must say that it is the difficult times that create bonds and, because you give more during these times, that tie you to a place. You develop almost a tribal loyalty to the people and the place when you work together through difficulties. I will miss the character of this college and all it has meant to me these past four years.

What do you think are the main differences/similarities between VCC and George Brown?

It was the similarities that attracted me to

George Brown and vice versa. The range of programs is very similar. George Brown has a large ESL program, the largest apprenticeship training in the province, a top notch hospitality tourism centre and a great variety of vocational programs.

George Brown, in addition, has a social service ethic and provides daycare centres and other social services. It has an inspiring Access Division and aims to make a difference in a city with growing social problems and a very diverse multicultural population. There is a lot to be done and a very strong commitment on the part of the new President of George Brown to provide the best possible service to the students and to the city's communities.

PUBLIC INFORMATION MEETING - VANCOUVER COMMUNITY COLLEGE/ MT. PLEASANT RECREATION CENTRE

The shared community recreation centre at King Edward Campus is another step closer to reality.

Funding for the Centre increased from the original \$400,000 to \$1.5 million when the Ministry of Advanced Education approved in March of this year a \$1.1 million special project fund provided we can finance the rest. The project is expected to cost \$4.6 million.

Our committee of College, Parks Board and Mt. Pleasant Centre Association representatives has for the past six months been working on fundraising plans. An interesting development is the proposal for a students social and study area funded by students through Students Action Council. This is in addition to the proposed gymnasium, multi-purpose rooms, meeting rooms and office space.

We will be jointly hosting a PUBLIC INFORMATION MEETING on September 26, 1991, to present architectural plans, programming and room use for both the College and the community. Session I from 3:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. is for the convenience of faculty, staff and students. Session II from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. is for the general public. Now Available: Class Lists on Floppy Disks for ESL and ABE Instructors

What is this service?

It is now possible to obtain on a floppy disk the names and registration numbers of your students.

How do I obtain my lists?

At the end of the second week of the term, give the following to Frank Fornelli:

- 1. One blank floppy disk (5½, DOS-formatted, 360K) with your name written on it.
- 2. A list of your classes by class code and section code as shown on the printed lists provided by Student Records; e.g. 3G5083 871

The student lists for the classes you specify will be copied to your floppy disk and returned to your mail box within two days.

How do I use the files?

On your disk will be one file for each class/section. Each file will contain the family name, given name, and registration number for each student in that class/section. The names and numbers will be within quotation marks and separated by commas; e.g. "LOWE", "SUSAN", "90954732". Each student will be on a separate line.

The file names/extensions will in the form "class.section"; e.g. 1A4094.891

To import a file into your spreadsheet:

- 1. Rename the file using an appropriate name and .CSV as the extension; e.g. HIS094.CSV (or) LOWADV.CSV
- 2. Open the file from within your spreadsheet program.

The student data will be arranged in 3 columns. Each student will be placed on a separate row.
