CHRISTEL NIEROBISCH AND ROSE MARIE WATSON TEACHING IN CZECHOSLOVAKIA

Christel Nierobisch and Rose Marie Watson will be spending the next six weeks instructing Czechoslovakian teachers of English as a Second Language. The teacher training institute in which they will be taking part is sponsored by the Association of Canadian Community Colleges and the Czech and Slovak Republic. Questions Most Frequently Asked

Q.1 I hear your expenses are pretty high - what about your costs?

The cost of running our campaign is just under 10%, which is one of the lowest expenses for any charity in North America. Because we have our United Way Endowment Fund, administered by the Vancouver Foundation, most of that cost is covered, so that 98% of your donation goes directly into services to help people. local people. That's tremendous value for your donation, and only 2% goes into costs. And if you wish, you can still donate to your favorite charity through our donor choice program.





AGENDA: The Future of Instructional Computing at KEC!

In April 1989, a "Plan" for the future of instructional computing at KEC was created and distributed to all concerned. The following are a few of the recommendations that document proposed:

- #1 All departments at KEC should have access to computer labs for group instruction.
- #4 All instructors should have access to modern display technologies for the presentation of computer generated images.
- #6 KEC should encourage instructors to investigate methods of integrating all types of software into the classroom, including those programs that are not normally thought of as educational.
- #8 A microcomputer (or computer terminal) with high quality software should be included as standard equipment in each instructor's office.
- #16 KEC should develop a computer orientation program and make it available to existing and prospective students.

And finally...

#18 Once a year the Computer Needs Committee should host a meeting to adjust KEC's long-term computing goals and set priorities for what implementations should occur that year.

THE TIME FOR REVIEW AND ADJUSTMENT HAS ARRIVED!

At the meeting on October 23rd the Committee will:

- review the 1989 "Plan"
- begin the process of establishing new recommendations and setting new priorities
- clarify the role of the CNC in the implementation of the "Plan"



ICSC COMPUTING CORNER

·Directories

I have been told that there are times when I will need to get into the directory of my word processor. What is meant by this?

A:

When you have a file created in one word processor, and you need to convert it to another word processor while retaining most of the appearance, it is necessary to go into the directory of your wordprocessor.

The hard disk of your computer holds probably at least 40 megabytes of data. There is room there for a great many files. However these must be organized in an orderly fashion, otherwise the information contained in these files would be very difficult to find.

In order that the data contained in your files is easily accessible, your hard disk is divided into a number of compartments called DIRECTORIES

Think of your hard disk as a FILING CABI-NET. Each directory on your disk is like a drawer in a filing cabinet. Each drawer is labelled with the name of a different topic and each drawer contains only files relating to that topic.

So, when your hard disk is divided into directories, each directory is given a name. For example if you use WordPerfect 5.1, one of your directories will probably be labelled WP51. If you use Word 5.0, one of your directories will probably be labelled, WORD5

The main directory on your hard dirive is called the ROOT DIRECTORY. It is represented by the backslash\symbol. When the C:\> appears on your screen, this means that you are in the root directory of your C drive.

To change into a specific directory, you should first exit to DOS. If the C:\> does not appeart on your screen, type CD\ This means CHANGE DIRECTORY to the Root or \ directory.

To see what directories are contained on your hard disk, type DIR at the C:> prompt. A list of files will appear on your screen.


When you see the extension <DIR>, this means that there is a separate directory under that name. There are 4 separate directories on the disk above, DOS, WORD5, LOTUS.and WORDPERFECT5.1

To change into the WordPerfect 5.1 directory, type CD \ WP51

C:\ > WP51 will now appear on the screen.. This means that you are now in the WordPerfect 5.1 directory.

If you type DIR all the files contained in the WP51 directory will appear on the screen

To change into the Word directory, type CD\ WORD5
