HAPPY DEEPAWALI!

Deepawali is a magnificent religious festival for Hindus, and is celebrated with great pomp and show by Hindus both at home in India or abroad.

Deepawali falls in the month of October or November every year and this year it is on November 5th.

The word Deepawali literally means row of lamps and this is a festival when every house is illuminated with lamps. People start their preparations weeks ahead of time and temples are decorated with old religious scenes which are of great religious significance.

Deepawali, festival of lights, marks the victory of good over evil. Lord Rama defeated King Ravna of Sri Lanka and returned to Ayodhya after 14 years of exile. People of Ayodhya welcomed Lord Rama with burning lights on top of their houses.

Huge, happy crowds of old and young, men and women, boys and girls, can be seen in the streets, villages, towns and cities enjoying the fun and in festive mood.

K.E.C. COUNSELLING SERVICES REDUCED

This is in response to the inquiries concerning counselling service reductions. Cut-backs in counselling services for students and prospective students did follow hard upon the heels of funding reductions of \$91,000.

Counselling Services are now spread very thin. Meanwhile, we presently are maintaining evening counselling services for students, prospective students, and instructors, as well as the services for K.E.C. North. Any further reductions likely would have resulted in the elimination of these services.

I have been asked why these reductions occurred. Perceptions vary. According to my own personal observations, Student Services has adequate funding for Counselling Services, and the funding reduction for Counselling Services for students follows upon Administrations' decision to reallocate funds within some areas of Student Services.

Given this situation, we hope this adequately addresses your questions and that you now understand why some services for your students have been reduced. Thank you for your patience.

ADULT BASIC EDUCATION STUDENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (ABESAP) OCT. 91

WHAT IS A.B.E.S.A.P.?

ABESAP is a program funded by the provincial government to provide partial grants for <u>tuition fees only</u> for needy students. With reduced funding this year grants are limited!!! Only one application is accepted per term. (Spring term: January-April; Summer term: May-August; Fall term: Sept.-Dec.)

WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO APPLY?

You can apply for ABESAP if you are a Canadian citizen, landed immigrant or have been determined to be a convention refugee (refugee claimants do not qualify). All students with S.I.N. starting with 900 must show immigration papers. ABESAP grants are available at V.C.C.-King Edward Campus for the following programs:

- B.E.S.T.
- B.T.S.D
- College Foundation
- Pt-time Courses at gr.11/12 (CF, ABE, CPE & BTSD)
- College Preparatory English 059/098/099
- English Language Skills (PT/FT Time)
- English As A Second Language (Outreach, Canadiana, fee payers)
- Institutional Aide

WHEN CAN I APPLY?

One month before registration, (Nov. 18th for Spring 92) you can pick up an ABESAP application from the Financial Aid Office (#4029) or Counselling.

* RETURNING STUDENTS

If you are a <u>returning</u> student (have a K.E.C. student number), you must have the teacher's comment section B on your application completed. You can apply one month before you register !!!

* NEW STUDENTS

If you are a <u>NEW</u> student (no K.E.C. student number), You do <u>not</u> have to complete section B (teacher's comments) on your application form. You can apply one month before you register !!!

* DEADLINE TO APPLY FOR ABESAP IS ONE MONTH AFTER START OF CLASSES...IT IS RECOMMENDED TO APPLY EARLY (ONE MONTH BEFORE REGISTRATION!!!)

PLEASE NOTE:

- 1) ALL ESL students who are being supported by MSSH may find that MSSH no longer funds ESL courses.
- 2) Continued ABESAP funding is dependent on successful academic progress. ABESAP MAY NOT BE AVAILABLE FOR STUDENTS REPEATING THE SAME LEVEL.
- 3) CONTINUED RECEIPT OF ABESAP FUNDS IS DEPENDENT UPON ATTENDANCE.

ICSC COMPUTING CORNER

Converting MS Word to WordPerfect



I have a document which was created using MS Word. I need to make some changes using WordPerfect. How can this file be converted to WordPerfect?



To convert a file from Word to WordPerfect, the file must be changed from the usual MS Word format to a special format called REVISABLE TEXT FORMAT (RTF). You do not need to know how to do this. You merely instruct the word processor to do the work for you.

The next step is to instruct WordPerfect to convert this RTF file to an RTF format recognized by WordPerfect. This involves issuing a few simple commands.

The file is then ready to be retrieved by WordPerfect in the usual way.

To convert a file from MS WORD to WORDPERFECT, you must have access to MS Word and to WordPerfect.

Instructions for Converting from MS Word to WordPerfect

Converting an MS Word File to MS Word Revisable Text Format

Your file is called A:DECOY.DOC

- Enter the MS Word directory. (See KEC TImes OCTOBER 17)
 C:\ WORD5 > should appear on the screen Type WORD_DCA
- You will be prompted:
 Select Conversion Type:
 Enter A or B ==> You type A
- You will be prompted:
 Enter the Input File List
 ==> A:DECOY.DOC
- Enter the Output File List ==> A:DECOY.WPF

There should be no further messages

Converting to WordPerfect from MS Word RTF

Your file is called A:DECOY.WPF

- Enter the WP51 directory Type CONVERT
- Name of input file: A:DECOY.WPF
- Name of output file:
 DECOY.WP5 (or whatever name you have decided upon)
- A list of choices will appear. You type 2
- **■** Press ENTER

A:DECOY.WPF converted to A:DECOY.WP5

You may retrieve this file into WordPerfect in the usual manner.
