UPDATE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

I will pass on some comments, however, about events related directly to instruction and to the future of the College.

Tri Party Discussion

There discussions concerning the financial status of the College and possible reorganization, have continued for some months. The pace has picked up recently - in the week of March 02 we were scheduled for 3 days of discussions. Currently, the Tri Party Committee is scheduled for a meeting with Minister Tom Perry on March 13.

Program Profile and Budget 1992-1993

John Vandenakker has been coordinating the preparation of the Program Profile for both City Centre and King Edward Campus. At present the Ministry has asked us to prepare the Profile at the 100% level of what we submitted last fall.

John will also be working with Brant Wasney, David Kolot and the Division Chairs to prepare a budget for both campuses by March 30. Please remember this is a first version of the budget and many changes may occur.

ESL Purchases

I understand from Alison Norman that purchases of ESL seats by EIC are at an all-time high. In March, 1992 we have 684 seats purchased and every room is full. We have <u>verbal</u>

reassurance that EIC will continue to purchase at a reasonable level in the new fiscal year.

This was done after consultation with the College President and with the VCC-FA. This will help in the administration of our instructional programs while further reorganization is discussed.





WordPerfect-Moving Text

Wordprocessors make it easy to move text from one location in a document to another or to move text from one document completely and insert it in another.

Moving Text

To move text from its current location to a new location in the document, follow these steps:

- 1. Place the cursor at the start of the text to be moved.
- 2. Press CTRL-F4 and choose 1-Sentence, 2-Paragraph or 3-Page.
- 3. A second menu will appear at the bottom of the screen Choose Move. The text will disappear into temporary memory until you carry out the next step.
- 4. Move the cursor to the location to which you wish to move the text and press ENTER. The text will now appear in the new location.

Moving Blocks of Text.

To move text which does not meet the criteria of Sentence, Paragraph or Page, you may block off the text and then move it. The steps are:

- 1. Place the cursor at the beginning of the text to be moved. Press ALT-F4 to begin blocking and use the cursor keys to block the text to be moved.
- 2. Press CTRL F4 and then choose 1-Block
- 3. Choose 1-Move from the next menu which appears.
- Move the text to the new location and press ENTER.

Moving between Documents:

When moving text from one document to another, it is convenient to open both documents, then split the screen in two so that both documents may be viewed simultaneously.

Instructons:

- 1. Open the first document in the usual manner.
- Press the Switch Key, Shift-F3, and open the second document using F5 List Files
- Press Ctrl-F3 and choose 1.Window.
 Number of lines: Type 12.
 The screen will now be split in the middle and both documents will be on view.
- 4. Follow the steps outlined above for moving text, using the F3 key to toggle between the two documents.

Note: the text which is moved is held in memory and may be retrieved with Ctrl-F4 Retrieve until replaced.

Moving Text from One Document to Another

Once the second document is open, text may be moved from one document t o the other.

First document appears in the top part of the screen

Ctrl-F3 to view both documents

Shift-F3 to toggle between documents.

Setting up a Schedule in Word

The following is an expanded version of information which appeared in January's Computing Corner.

It is a good idea to set up the schedule to your satisfaction and then save a blank version. This will now act as a template into which you may enter data each term.

The steps involved in setting up a schedule using MS WORD are:

- 1. Drawing a BOX
- 2. Setting Tabs

Instructions:

1. Format Border Box

Step	1

- 2. Set VERTICAL
 ALIGNED TABS at one inch intervals. (See instructions at end of article.)
- 3. Pressing the TAB key will now draw vertical lines at 1" intervals. The BOX will be divided into a number of mini boxes or cells.

Step 11				

4. You will now have set up one line of your schedule.

Pressing the ENTER key will produce a replica of this line. Repeat as often as you need.

- To prepare for data entry, (class times, office hours etc.) set LEFT ALIGNED tabs at 1.2", 2.2", 3.2" etc
- 6. Press the TAB key to enter each cell.

- 7. Now SAVE your blank schedule under an easily remembered name for use in the next term.
- 8. Enter data. To enter a second line of data in one cell, press Shift-Enter. When all data is complete, save this version under another name.

Reducing Eye Irriatation

Computer-EYE-tis is defined as: fatigue, dry, tired eyes and blurred vision resulting from extended reading on a video display terminal.

This term (coined by the American Optical Corporation, Southbridge, MA.) describes symptons which have been experienced by many of us after prolonged gazing at the Video Display Terminal (VDT) or monitor of our computers..

The February edition of UBC's Campus Computing newsletter contains an article retrieved from the database of the CCENEWS, the Electronic Forum for Campus Computing newsletter Editors, outlining possible causes of these symptons and steps which can be taken to alleviate them.

Eyeglasses whether reading glasses or bifocals are designed to bring printed papers into focus when they are sixteen inches away from your eyes. Since a VDT rests twenty to twenty six inches away from your eyes, it is not always in focus. It is also usually located at a higher angle than normal reading material and so the eyes must strain to read it.

Corrective Measures

If you suffer from computerEYEtis, you should inform your eye doctor that you use a computer. Let the doctor know how far the computer screen is from your eyes, how high the screen is in relation to your eyes and if there is a glare from the screen.

Ask your doctor about eyeglasses designed for the computer user.

Special "computer glasses " provide lenses that allow the user to comfortably vies the VDT.
