

History of the ICSC

The ICSC was conceived of in 1987 and funded by a grant from the Ministry. Gordon Pawelchak, and Walter Behnke in consultation with the CNC and assisted by ICS members Bob Hamura and Elizabeth Burnyeat, were involved in setting up the Centre as a workroom where faculty could use technology not available in their own offices for curriculum development and classroom material. Space was made available by the Library for a

The ICSC is also a place where computer users from different disciplines can share and compare ideas and expertise.

This news-letter is produced in the ICSC, using MS Word for word processing, Pagemaker for page layout and Scanning Gallery for scanning in the pictures.. New equipment is currently being installed in the Centre and there will be a detailed description of what is available there in the next issue of the Computing Corner.

Small group workshops are conducted on the use of any of the software or hardware in the ICSC. It has been found thatone or two hour mini workshops are most effective. Frequently, a mini workshop at the ICSC is found to be a useful confidence builder for a full day workshop elsewhere on the same topic.

A Macro is a timesaver. It is a quick key defined by you, the user, to enable you to access a

repetitive keystrokes which you would willingly replace. These may involve features as simple as italicising a word after it has been typed, or clearing the screen and opening a new document.

Creating a macro is not difficult. However, it is a good idea to write down all the keystrokes EXACTLY as used before starting to create your

macro. Then when creating the macro, type in each one. However, if when you come to use your macro, you find you have omitted certain keystrokes, it is easy to edit the macro and insert them.

Once familiar with macros, you will

think up many more ways in which you can use them. You will find it useful to exchange macros with others who use your word processor. These may be copied from one disk to another.

WordPerfect Macro to Italicise a Word After it is Typed.

This macro includes the keystrokes to italicise a word after it has been typed.

- Begin with a clear document and press CTRL-F10 (Define macro) The prompt DEFINE MACRO will appear on the status line asking you to name the macro
- 2. Press ALT-I [ENTER]
- DESCRIPTION will appear on the status line
 Type in a brief description of the macro-eg. "italicise a word."

4. MACRO DEF will flash on the status line.

Now you enter the key strokes neccessary to italicise a word after it has been typed. These are:

CTRL [CTRL and left arrow to move to start of word]

ALT-F [Block On]

CTRL [CTRL and right arrow to block to end of word]

CTRL-F8

9. CTRL-F10 to complete macro.

Invoking the Macro

Press ALT-I (letter i) to invoke this macro. When ALT-I is pressed, the preceding word will be italicised.

Sharing Macros

These macros will not only be featured in the newsletter, but also copied to a disk and placed in the ICSC where they will be available to all who wish to copy them to their own disks.

Using the Macro:

Invoking the macro in the following sentence, will cause the word Pygmalion to be italicised.

Eliza Dolittle is the female lead in Pygmalion by George Bernard Shaw

Place the cursor in the space after
Pygmalion, press ALT-I and
Pygmalion will be italicised and the
cursor returned to its original location.
CTRL will move the cursor so
that more than one word can be
italicised.

This macro can be changed to use any of the features in the CTRL-F8 menu by substituting the appropriate letter for I(talics) in the instructions.

MS Word

It was intended that the same features would be included for Word and WordPerfect in each issue of the ICSC Newsletter. However, Word users know how few keystrokes are involved in formatting characters or paragraphs in Word, so there is no advantage in creating a macro to use these features... Pressing the ALT key with a single letter, will turn on any character or formatting feature. These are outlined on the keyboard template:

Press ALT with listed key for action below. With style sheet attached, press ALT-X followed by listed key.

- B Bold
- D Double underline
- Hidden
- K Small caps
- S Strikethrough
- U Underline
- Superscript +,=
- Subscript

normal character.

To italicise a word, press ALT-I, type the text to be italicised, and press ALT-spacebar to resume normal text.

Paragraph Formats

- C Centred
- F Indent first line to next tab
- J Justified
- L Left flush
- M Reduce left indent to previous tab.
- N Increase left indent
- 0 Open space above paragraph
- P Normal paragraph
- Q Indent from left and right
- R Right flush
- T Hanging indent
- Double spacing

To double space a paragraph, position the cursor anywhere in the paragraph and press ALT-D, or ALT-S for single spacing.

Macro

The following macro could be used to enter text in numbered paragraphs. It sets a tab at .5" and then creates a hanging indent of .5", allowing you to format text as follows.

- 1. Press Shift-F3 to turn on Word's Macro recorder. The letters RM appear at the bottom right hand corner of the screen.
- 2. Hold down CTRL while pressing
- 3. Press F(ormat) T(ab) S(et) .5 [Enter]
- 4. Hold down CTRL while pressing **ESC**
- 5. Press F(ormat) P(aragraph) Tab to Left Indent, type .5 Tab to First Line Indent, type -.5 Tab to Space Before, type 1 [Enter]
- 6. Press Shift F3

The words Copy to {} will appear on the screen asking you to name the macro

Type Hang Indent

You will now need to decide on two letters by which the macro can be identified. I have chosen The letter combination GI

Press Shift-6 (^will appear)

Press CTRL-G

Press I [Letter I]

Hang Indent<CTRL G>I will appear on the screen

[Enter]

7. Save this macro

ESC T(ransfer) G(lossary) S(ave)

- Load this macro by pressing ESC TGL Hang_Ind
- To use it, press CTRL-GI
- 10 Type 1. Press the TAB key and continue entering text.

Disks-High Density or Double Density?

Disks come in two sizes, 3.5 inch disks which formerly could be used only on the Mac, but now are also used on MS

computers.

DOS

The other size is the 5.25 disk pictured here.



The 3.5" disk or the 5.25" disk may be a High Density or Double Density disk. High Density disks are used by 286 and more recent computers, and hold roughly four times as much data as a doubledensity disk.

An XT or any older computer will not read a high density disk, and will give an error message when asked to do so.

To format your old double density 3.5" disks so that they may be used by your new computer, this command must be

Format B:/T:80/n:9 (if using B drive)

aural discrimination for pronounciation and spelling.


The "Time Tutor", developed in conjunction with Roma Sedgman,. gives Intermediate and Advanced ESL students a diagnostic assessment of

their ability to hear tenses, a non-linear presentation of the semantics of time in English and paragraph-context exercises.

Both the Tongue Tuner and The Time Tutor are very popular with students in the Learning Centre.

Both programs are very easy to follow requiring very little explanation.
