Re: Study Tour to Examine the German Dual System of Trades and Apprenticeship Training

A professional development opportunity involving a study tour to Germany is scheduled for November of this year. The program focuses on the collaborative relationships between training institutions and the private sector.

Both Canada and Germany are facing the challenge of competitiveness. A well-trained workforce and improved relations between industry and training partners are seen as key elements in meeting this challenge.

The 1992 tour will take place between Nov. 14, the date of arrival in Germany, and Nov. 27, the departure date. Visits to industrial sites, training institutions, government departments, etc., will centre around the three cities of Cologne, Hamburg and Berlin (sites may be subject to change). Each participant must pay his/her own airfare. Accommodation, meals and transportation expenses within Germany are defrayed by the partner organization, the Carl Duisberg Gesellschaft. In addition, the ACCC requests a financial contribution of \$3,500 which will permit us to defray these same expenses for a group of German colleagues who will visit Canada next year.

In order to meet the objectives of this program, we are seeking participants from colleges and institutes who will each recruit a partner from industry. The industry representative will be subject to the same terms and conditions, outlined above.

RE: Exchange Opportunity for an Expert/Scholar in Vocational Training

On behalf of our partner organization in Germany, the ACCC is soliciting your assistance in determining whether an expert/scholar in vocational training within your college/institute is interested in participating in a reciprocal exchange opportunity. This 1, 2, or 3 month program has as its objective the in-depth study of the German Dual System and/or certain other aspects of the German training system.

The candidate should

- have a good knowledge of the German language
- be working in the field of vocational training
- have an academic background in vocational training and education.

The exchange will begin early in 1993 preferably, in the Duisberg region (Ruhr region) of Germany. The participant's college/institute must continue to pay the individual's salary during the exchange period and his/her airfare to Germany. The German counterpart will assume all costs related to the in-Germany portion of the visit; meals and accommodation, transportation within Germany, insurance, and a cultural by-program.

As this is a reciprocal arrangement, your college/institute must also contemplate hosting an expert/researcher from Germany whose objective would be to examine vocational training in Canada. The time frame and the terms and conditions of the exchange ought to be identical. The manner in which costs are covered will follow the process described above only in reverse.

Through its various government contacts, the ACCC is currently exploring other sources of funding to cover all or part of the expenses associated with this exchange project but we cannot confirm any financial assistance at this time.

Computing Corner

Laser Printers

Laser printers provide clear, crisp, high quality characters. They print excellent graphics and are quieter than dot-matrix printers. A laser beam is used to generate an image on a drum. This image picks up toner (ink) and is then transferred to paper.

Purchasing

There are two considerations to purchasing a laser printer:

1. what it can do for you
2. how much it will cost?

Questions:

"What can it do?" questions include:

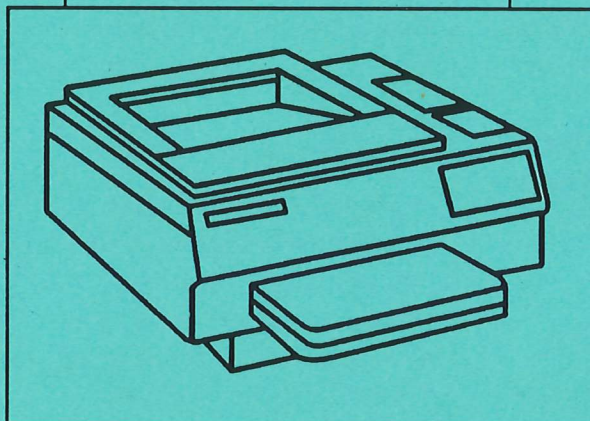
- fonts built in to the printer?
- additional fonts ?
- printer resolution?
- speed?
- paper handling capabilities?
- standard memory?
- how much memory can be added?-important information when printing graphics.

Cost-value questions are:

- initial cost? •
- operating costs?

Fonts:

A font is a collection of letters, numbers and symbols of a specific typeface, all with the same point size, pitch and treatment. (The terms in bold are discussed on page 2)



Fonts may be "scalable" or "bitmapped". Scalable fonts can be shrunk or enlarged to allow you to print any size that you choose.



Bitmapped fonts come in predetermined sizes; eg 10, 12 or 14 point. Only the sizes supplied will be available to the user.

eg **Courier 10 point**
Courier 14 point

Printer Resolution:

Printer resolution is a measure of the sharpness of the image that the printer produces. It is measured in dots per inch (dpi). Most laser printers have a resolution of 300 dpi. A resolution of 600 dpi is also available.

Printer Speed:

Printer speed is measured according to the number of pages the printer can print per minute (ppm). The laser printer in the ICSC prints at 8ppm but 4ppm is sufficient if only a small number of users are sharing the printer.

Paper Handling:

Paper handling involves:

- the number of sheets which can be loaded into a tray
- whether the printer can print on one side or two sides (duplex) of the page
- if a second tray can be added
- how it prints envelopes

Standard Memory.

All printers come with some memory-one megabyte seems to be the standard. However, additional memory (at least one additional megabyte) will be needed to print graphics. It is important to know how much memory can be added to the printer.

Cost:

The initial cost of the printer will depend on the model purchased. A number of Hewlett Packard models are discussed. These are offered merely as a basis for comparison with other manufacturer's products.

In addition to the quoted price, the cost of additional memory and fonts must be considered.

Operating Costs:

Laser printers consume toner as part of the printing process. Replacement toner cartridges can vary from \$35.00 to \$265.00. Recyclable cartridges are available.

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Postscript Printers

Postscript is a graphics command language for laser printers adapted by Adobe Systems. Postscript allows the user access to scalable fonts and to draw lines and circles. Laser printers which have this language built in are called Postscript Printers eg the Mac printer in the ICSC is a QMSPostscript printer. Lower priced Hewlett-Packard LaserJet printers are not postscript printers, but they have a cartridge slot into which a postscript cartridge can be slipped giving the printer postscript capabilities eg HP laser printer in the ICSC. Extra memory is required.

Printer Drivers

A printer driver tells your software what type of printer you are using. When you change to a laser printer, you must inform your software of this or the printer will not work for you.

Postscript Options

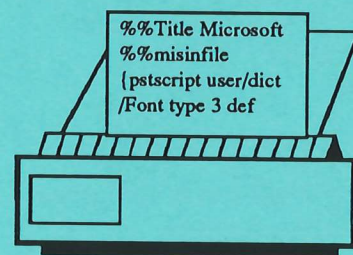
You can take advantage of all the postscript fonts on your home computer *even though you do not have a laser printer*. You merely tell your software that you are using a postscript printer. (If you are not sure how to do this, check your software manual or see below) Then you "Select" the postscript printer before you type your document. *You will*

now have access to all the postscript typefaces and fonts on your own computer. For example, Richard installed a postscript printer driver on the copies of WordPerfect in the Student Lab. Students in DataProcessing 083, could create their documents using the postscript capabilities even though there is not a postscript laser printer in the student lab.

For assistance in installing a printer driver, call Anne McElroy, Local 7382, or Richard at the ICSC, Local 7218.

Switching Printers

A word of caution. If you select the postscript printer driver, and then decide to print a draft copy on your dot-matrix printer, you must first **SELECT THE DOT MATRIX**



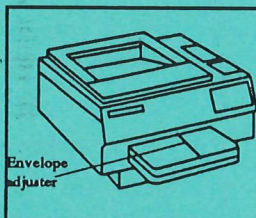
PRINTER. If you do not do so, you will be sending postscript instructions to a printer which does not understand them. You will get what looks like reams of garbage printed out. If this happens, just turn off the printer, readjust the page setting and start again, selecting the dot-matrix driver before you print.

Hewlett-Packard LaserJet Printers

Some Hewlett Packard laser printers including the LaserJet 111P, LaserJet 111, LaserJet 111D and the LaserJet111Si are discussed on the following pages. Costs quoted were supplied by a Hewlett Packard dealer and reflect the educational discount available to faculty and staff who wish to purchase a laser printer for

personal use. They are intended to serve as a basis for comparison with other dealers and models.

All of these printers can be beefed up with additional memory and a variety of cartridges, including postscript, can be added.



HP LaserJet 111P

The HP LaserJet 111P is a compact laser printer. At \$1243.00, it is the most economical of the HP laser printers and is a good choice for one or just a few users.

Fonts:

- 8 scalable fonts (in reality what you get are 4 different treatments of 2 typefaces—normal, bold, *italic* and **bold italic**)

- 14 bitmapped fonts
- Additional fonts may be purchased. Remember that these may require additional memory.

Resolution

- 300 dpi, resolution is crisp and clear.

Speed

- 4 pages per minute

Memory

- One megabyte standard. Additional memory may be added up to 5 megabytes total.

Paper Capacity:

- 70 sheets fit in the supplied tray
Tray may be adjusted to hold 5 envelopes
Lower cassette paper tray may be added holding up to 250 sheets
Prints on one side of sheet only(simplex)

Graphic Capability

- excellent
additional memory is required for graphics.

Prices are approximate and should be checked with the dealers.

HP LaserJet 111

The HP LaserJet 111 is a larger faster model. Along with the HP LaserJet 111D, it is suitable when the printer is shared among several users as in the ICSC.

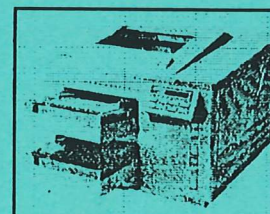

One of our instructors uses this printer with a Pacific Page XL (2MB) Postscript speed cartridge and finds this very satisfactory.

HP LaserJet 111D

This printer costing \$2825.00, has similar capabilities to the HP LaserJet111. In addition it has the option of two paper trays, so can handle twice as much paper. It can print on both sides of the page (duplex). Another option is the power envelope feeder which accepts up to 50 envelopes at a time.



HP LaserJet 111SI

At a whopping \$4317.00 this model is reputed to be a beauty with a speed of 15 ppm and 2 paper trays holding 500 sheets each. Other features are 13 scalable typefaces and 14 bitmapped fonts and optional additional memory up to 17 MB total.

This model would be useful where heavy paper output is important.

HP PaintJet XL300

None of the Hewlett-Packard LaserJets discussed can be upgraded to colour.

The HP PaintJet is not a laser printer but an ink jet printer. It can print in different colours and produce laser quality text. Additional memory is available

Printing speed is slow, text takes 1-2 minutes per page (mpp) and graphics up to 10 mpp. At a cost of \$2783.00 for the plain printer and \$3875.00 for the Postscript inkjet printer, it is mentioned only for those who may be wondering about colour printers.

Typography Terms

Typeface

Most of the typefaces used on computers today fall into the following categories:

1. *Roman Type, proportionally spaced with serifs.* This kind of type originated with the stone engravers of ancient Rome. Proportionally spaced means that different characters are different widths (eg. "M" is wider than "I"); serifs are the marks at the end of the strokes (eg the horizontal marks at the top and bottom of the I) Times Roman is a popular typeface of this variety.

Proportional pitch with serifs

Plain Bold *Italic*

Roman type is the most readable kind of type and is used for the text of most books. Blocks of Roman type should not be underlined. Use italics or boldface instead.

2. *Sans Serif type, proportionally spaced.* Two popular type-faces of this kind are

Geneva and Helvetica. This kind of type is better for short captions, posters or labels, but can be tiring to read for long periods.

3. *Fixed pitch, typewriter-like typefaces.* Courier is a typeface with all characters the same width. It is suitable where all the characters should be lined up.

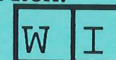
4. *Novelty typefaces such as Zapf Chancery.* These should be used sparingly and only for effect.
