BRITISH COLUMBIA LIBRARY ASSOCIATION B.C. INFORMATION POLICY CONFERENCE

Sponsored by the British Columbia Library Association Supported by the Canadian Centre for Studies in Publishing

This conference will explore the directions and social implications of telecommunications and information technology, the conflicting agendas of the main players in the information age, and the role, if any, for libraries. This represents an important opportunity for librarians and community groups concerned about information access issues to investigate opportunities for joint action.

Sessions will focus on telecommunications policy and networks, federal and provincial government information policy, privatization versus public access, and social information needs.

Established as a prelude to the National Information Summit, the conference will also focus on provincial and municipal information policy. Community groups, academics, government representatives, and the corporate sector, as well as librarians will be represented.

Speakers include: **Dr. Herbert Schiller**, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Communications at the University of California – San Diego and author of *Information and the Crisis Economy, The Mind Managers, Who Knows: Information in the Age of the Fortune 500, and Culture, Inc.: the Corporate Takeover of Public Expressions; Dr. Vincent Mosco, Professor, School of Journalism, Carlton University and author of <i>The Political Economy of Information, The Pay—per Society: computers and communication in the information age*, and *Pushbutton Fantasies: critical perspectives on videotext and information technology*, and **Nancy Kranich**, Association Dean of New York University Libraries and Chair of ALA's Legislation Subcommittee on Government Information as well as the Coalition on Government Information Steering Committee which includes 50 not–for–profit groups concerned with first amendment and freedom of information issues.

B.C. INFORMATION POLICY CONFERENCE

November 5 & 6, 1992

The increasing importance of information in Canadian society has intensified the need for a national information policy. Such a policy should address vital issues relating to citizen access to information. Concerns arising from the role that information plays in a wide range of activities undertaken by individuals, various groups, businesses and governments should also be addressed.

The following questions — and others of interest to you — will be discussed at the November B.C. Information Policy Conference:

What are the barriers to improving and increasing access to information?

What roles and responsibilities are appropriate for various levels of government, and for the private sector? Is information a public resource or a private commodity?

How can existing and new technologies be utilized? How are Canadians placed to make use of these innovations?

What use is made of information gathered? Is personal privacy protected adequately? Do citizens have the right to know?

How will alternative or minority voices and views be affected?

Policy questions such as these have implications in a variety of areas:

- public access to government information
- access to telecommunication networks
- transfer of personal information
- · corporate concentration in the media
- government support for publishers and libraries
- literacy programs

The conference will provide a forum for you to refine and to discuss your information policy concerns. It is being held as a prelude to the National Information Summit in Ottawa later this year, and will be of interest to a wide spectrum of groups and individuals from across B.C.: community groups, librarians, organizers, writers, consumers, publishers, businesses and educators.


