



SALVADOR FERRERAS

Although the phrase was first used to describe James Brown, the 'hardest working man in show business' might equally be applied to Sal Ferreras. Percussionist, teacher, producer, bandleader and all-around over-achiever, Sal has operated in almost every musical genre in the Vancouver area. He currently performs in Sumalao, Buka, CBC Vancouver Orchestra, Viveza, Vancouver New Music Ensemble and DrumHeat. He is an instructor in the music departments at both the University of Victoria and Vancouver Community College, where he recently developed a World Music course, the first of its kind in B.C.

All of this started in San Juan, Puerto Rico and continued in Chicago, Caracas (Venezuela), Windsor and Detroit, where he studied mainly classical and contemporary music. After arriving on the West Coast in 1980, Sal began to pay attention to his Latin American roots and he added some traditional music to his classical repertoire.

Sal has opened musical doors for many listeners, most recently as the host of the CBC network radio programme Out of This World. He is frequently featured on national radio as a performer of contemporary, classical, traditional and Latin American music. He has released two solo recordings, entitled To Drive in L.A. and Invisible Minority and can be heard on a variety of recordings encompassing a broad spectrum of musical styles.




