In March, Helen Tegenfeldt finished up a year's contract with Employment and Immigration Canada as consultant to A-LINC projects. A-LINC is the language assessment used for determining entry into federally sponsored LINC classes. Virginia Monk and Helen together developed the A-LINC in 1991-1992, and then put on a series of training workshops to train A-LINC raters across Canada.

Virigina and Helen just returned from Ottawa, where they reported on the A-LINC to a newly-formed National Advisory Group on federal LINC policy. Raminder Dosangh, from the ESL - Vocational Department, is a member of this influential committee. She is a representative, not only of the College, but also of the National Organization of Immigrant and Visible Minority Women, and the Affiliation of Multicultural Societies and Service Agencies of British Columbia.

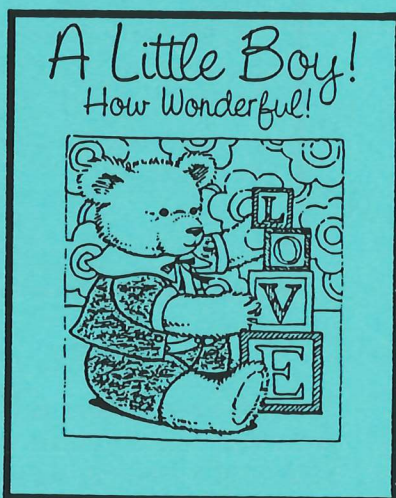

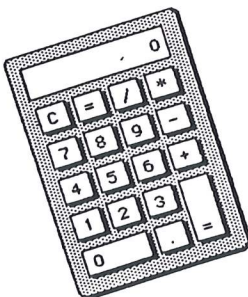

Now, with the modern age of computers and some very good programmes available, persons with low vision are able to do many things that were impossible forty years ago.

I am now studying computer courses available to me at King Edward Campus and I am restudying my geometry and algebra. I hope to become an architect, despite my age, and design small buildings.

What is so impressive about the programme for visually impaired students at King Edward Campus is, that students can learn at their own pace, something that was not possible at the elementary and high school levels, unless special extra teachers were employed at a heavy cost to the government.

I ask you to seriously consider the introduction of the same type of programme at the lower levels of education, that are in place at King Edward Campus. The Government will, in all possibilities, save a large amount of money, some of which could then be used to settle the contract dispute at Vancouver Community College.

I urge you to give this your serious consideration as it is the students that are most harmed by a strike.

TESL Professional Development Institute

This spring Vancouver Community College will initiate a new program to meet the professional development needs of experienced ESL instructors throughout the province. The Vancouver Community College TESL Professional Development Institute will focus on teaching methodologies, instructional strategies and curriculum development in areas relevant to the professional needs of practising ESL instructors.

■ **Storytelling: A Creative Approach to Teaching ESL**

This twenty-four hour course is designed for teachers who work with adult ESL classes. Participants will spend three sessions together learning storytelling techniques, exploring movement, gesture, breath and voice and rehearsing their individual tales for the fourth session, the Performance.

Instructor: Barbara Gerber

Barbara Gerber, M.Ed is a dynamic, energetic teacher trainer. Barbara is highly qualified in both the art of creative storytelling as well as the implementation of storytelling as an instructional device for teaching English as a Second Language. She has taught English as a Second Language since 1974 at Vancouver Community College and has been a teacher trainer with the Vancouver Community College TESL Certificate Program since 1988. She is a published poet and has performed as a storyteller in Vancouver, Maple Ridge, Czechoslovakia, and Boston.

■ **Curriculum Foundations**

This forty-four hour course will examine the fundamental premises, parameters and assumptions that delineate the field of curriculum and that provide a basic frame of reference for curriculum analysis, design and assessment. Through an exploration of trends and variables that significantly impact on curriculum decision-making, participants will gain insight into the basic foundations that give direction in education. Participants will also gain an understanding of major curriculum orientations, and an appreciation of how these orientations influence educational thought and practice.

Instructor: Dr. Margaret Andrews

Margaret Andrews Ph.D., is a highly respected teacher trainer and expert in the field of curriculum development. She is a Senior Lecturer for the Lesley College Graduate School in Boston, Massachusetts. She currently teaches graduate courses in Curriculum Theory, Curriculum Development and Multicultural Education. She has conducted graduate courses in Colorado, Missouri, Wisconsin, Nevada, Montana and Canada.

■ Teaching Academic Writing Using Rhetorical Patterns

This twelve hour course will examine instructional strategies for teaching academic writing using rhetorical patterns to ESL adult learners at the intermediate and advanced language levels. The course will begin by providing an overview of teaching writing for academic purposes. The product versus process approach to teaching writing will be discussed and debated. Teaching academic writing using rhetorical patterns will be defined through sample texts, materials and curricula, and evaluated in terms of both its benefits and drawbacks. Participants also will examine course planning, specific course components such as rhetorical patterns, paragraph frameworks, essay frameworks and source materials, and course implementation. Course implementation will be addressed in terms of lesson formats, student centered and paired writing activities, peer revision, writing conferences and evaluation strategies.

Instructor: Dr. Debbie Smith

Debbie Smith, Ph.D. is an experienced and highly skilled English as a Second Language teacher trainer and instructor. Since 1971, she has been teaching ESL and English for Special/Academic Purposes. She has taught at the London School of English in England, Camosun College, the UBC English Language Institute, Acadia University and Simon Fraser University. Debbie is currently teaching English for Academic Purposes at Douglas College, and has a special interest in developing curricula for teaching academic reading and writing skills. Debbie has extensive experience as a teacher trainer at both the University of British Columbia and Simon Fraser University.

B.C. ASIA-PACIFIC AWARDS

The Asia-Pacific Grant program is in addition to funding provided through the BC Asia-Pacific Awards for scholars and students.

The British Columbia Centre for International Education has received an allocation from the Ministry of Advanced Education, Training and Technology to fund the Asia-Pacific Grant program. The program has been established to enhance British Columbia public post-secondary students' understanding of the Asia-Pacific region and to contribute to the strengthening of linkage and exchange agreements between British Columbia and overseas institutions. 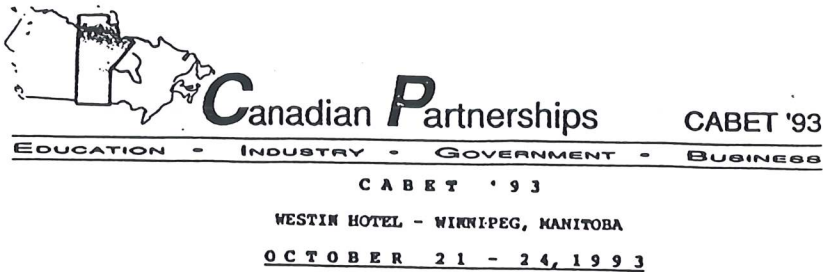
