### INSTRUCTIONAL SKILLS WORKSHOPS AT VCC BY JEAN COCKELL

The Instructional Skills Workshops (ISW) is an excellent professional development activity for anyone who takes an active role in the instruction of students. Working with a small group of colleagues, each participant designs and instructs mini-lesson which are video taped. Colleagues who have been trained as facilitators guide constructive feedback. The result is positively enhanced awareness of how to teach and learn. It is an opportunity to share ideas about teaching and learning with others in a non-judgemental framework.

Two successful Instruction Skills Workshops (ISWs) were held at VCC this past May. Participants included instructors, librarians, and instructional assistants from Langara and King Edward Campus. The four trained facilitators were instructors from Langara, King Edward Campus and UBC. The organizers from King Edward Campus and City Centre Campus were supported by the VCC Human Resource Development Department.

The feedback from the participants indicates that it was an excellent learning experience. The team building and sharing that occurred among people from various levels and areas of instructional experience was very valuable. The supportive atmosphere in the small groups made it possible for people to take risks in trying new instructional ideas.





### Post-secondary Application Service of British Columbia

In August 1993, the Minister of Advanced Education, Training and Technology, the Honourable Tom Perry, announced that B.C. will have a central service for processing applications to B.C. post-secondary institutions, to be located in Kamloops.

This is to give you some information about the nature of this service and how it might affect you and your students. However, information is tentative at this time and very many details remain to be worked out.

This centre will offer a high level of service, be operated jointly by the institutions and be independent of government.

What will the Service do?

- It will accept a single application form from a student, who may apply to several institutions or programs at the same time, using this form (the maximum number of multiple applications will be limited, but that number has yet to be decided).
- It will publish a comprehensive booklet detailing all available post-secondary programs in the public institutions together with their admission requirements.
- It will collect secondary school grades on behalf of the post-secondary institutions.
- It will control the number of offers which a student may hold.
- It will assist applicants who have no admission offer to find available or vacant places.

### What will the Service NOT do?

- It will not determine which institutions a student applies to or attends.
- It will not determine admissibility of students to any program these decisions will remain within each individual institution.
- It will not set admission policies for any institution. These decisions will continue to be made by each individual institution.

### Which post-secondary institutions will participate?

The following plan to participate:

- Four provincial universities: S.F.U., U.B.C., U.N.B.C., U.VIC;
- The Open Learning Agency, B.C.I.T., Emily Carr C.A.D.;
- Four university-colleges: Cariboo, Fraser Valley, Malaspina, Okanagan;
- Eleven colleges: Camosun, Capilano, Douglas, East Kootenay, Kwantlen, New Caledonia, North Island, Northern Lights, Northwest, Selkirk, Vancouver Community College.

### Notice to B.C. school principals and counsellors

### Which programs will be included in the Service?

Discussion is ongoing concerning program participation.

• Most post-secondary academic (bachelors' degrees and university transfer), career

and vocational programs will be included.

• Post-graduate, medicine, dentistry, law, Adult Basic Education, Special Needs Education, and programs of less than six months duration will not be included in the Service.

Which students will be affected by the introduction of the Service?

- All applicants for September 1995 admission will be expected to apply through PAS BC.
- Students currently in Grade 11, applying to enter post-secondary programs in September 1995, are the first group of B.C. secondary school students who will use the Service.
- Applicants from other Canadian provinces, international students and mature students will also apply through PAS BC.

What differences will the secondary schools see?

- There will be only one form for applying to most programs in B.C.
- Application information will be published in one booklet.
- There will be greater consistency of deadlines and procedures.

Grades need to be sent to one place only.

• There will be a single source of information on the application status of your students and on where your students finally enrolled.

Who will pay for this Service?

Applicants will pay an application fee, which is expected to cover the full cost of the service.

Future updates

At present, the Service is being established and further communications will be issued by the newly-appointed Director.
