LIBRARY NEWS

New Videos

There is a decidedly artistic spin to this week's titles. Those with an interest in New Music should check our **The Threshold of Deafening Silence** (24 min. 1992). It profiles Canadian composer Paul Dolden, who explores the grey area between all-digital studio recording and real-time ensemble performance.

Physical injury is a pervasive occupational hazard for performing musicians, as documented by **Strung Out** (13 min. 1992). This segment originally aired on CBC's Fifth Estate.

Family: A Loving Look at CBC Radio (50 min. 1991) was begun by Donald Brittain shortly before his death in 1989. Robert Duncan then completed this warm, candid and humorous profile of what has often been called "The Soul of Canada". All your faves are here: Peter Gzowski, Danny Finkleman, Lister Sinclair, Vicky Gabereau, etc.

An introduction to media analysis has been effectively realized by the NFB's 3-tape Media and Society (81, 95, 55 min. 1989) package. Excerpts of NFB films as well as introductory commentary are grouped into three broad subject areas: Advertising, cultural sovereignty and images of women. There is a very comprehensive teacher's guide and program organization allows maximum flexibility of use.

Modern and Abstract Painting in Canada (2x18 min. 1992) is a succinct and elegant summary of the seminal figures in Canadian contemporary painting: Emily Carr, Alfred Pellan, Adrien Hebert, Guido Molinari, Jack Shadbolt and many more.

CANADIAN GEMS IN THE LIBRARY

It has been some time since we in the library have had the luxury to become absorbed in all the new titles in the ESL collection. In 1990 when Phyllis Butler and I had the opportunity to work on the ENGILSH AS A SECOND LANGUAGE BIBLIOGRAPHY, we were able to take a close look at our materials and gain an appreciation for the intent and pedagogy of teaching English to speakers of other languages.

One feature that Phyllis and I stressed in our bibliography was Canadian content and the relevance of titles to the Canadian cultural experience. Although it is tough these days to keep on top of publications and all the new editions put out by VCC and our teaching colleagues, I would like to mention two very popular titles by Prentice-Hall who had the wisdom to publish a well-known writer from the King Edward Camps ESL Division.

Susan Bates from ESL Vocational has been on a publishing streak for the last few years with her AMAZING! titles that rarely sit on the library shelves before they are checked out by grateful students. With her Prentice-Hall publication CANADIAN NEWSPAPER **AMAZING!** STORIES, she developed an integrated reading and language text built on Canadian newspaper stories that provide students with the opportunity to study language and learn about our society and cultural milieu. For beginner to low intermediate readers, the stories are prefaced by interactive activities, a section on geography to situate the story, and attractive illustrations done by the author to provide a context for the story that follows. Students have an opportunity to read about the first Canadian woman to climb Everest, an Indo-Canadian man who saves a child falling from a sixth storey balcony, the success of an Inuit man who upgraded his education as an adult and became a translator.

and the late-life marriage of two Eastern European sweethearts who reunite in Canada, to mention just a few of the stories in the text.

With **AMAZING! INTERVIEWS** AND CONVERSATIONS, Susan Bates has taken themes from her original work and created a listening and speaking text with tapes containing interviews with members of the Canadian public from throughout our country. Again, the culture of Canada is emphasized with facts and information introducing each section to give the student a foundation for the theme. As the reader becomes immersed in subjects like immigration, opening a small business, giving birth, the life of seniors, the chapters unfold with listening and speaking activities that encourage the acquisition, of language, promote intercultural discussion, provide interesting and practical exercises. Like its CANADIAN NEWSPAPER STORIES companion, this set includes an instructor's manual supplementary materials and additional prereading and discussion activities.

It will be a little easier for you and your students to borrow these items shortly as we are purchasing additional copies and will have them processed soon.



VCC is currently in Year Three of a three-year linkage project with the Sri Jayachamarajendra College of Engineering (SJCE) in Mysore, India and several VCC faculty members have had the opportunity to travel to Mysore to provide technical assistance.

Mr. Shivaram, faculty member of SJEC-STEP (Science and Technology Entrepreneurs Park), is currently in Vancouver on a training program, and is prepared to offer to VCC employees the opportunity to participate in a "different" kind of stress management program, which he has developed and presents regularly at SJEC-STEP.

<u>Management of the Human System for Better Performance</u> examines body and mind, mind and intellect, their effect on each other and the need for management. Relaxation and meditation are key elements of this eastern style approach to stress management.
