## LIBRARY NEWS

### NEW VIDEOS

Considerations of culture, identity and race in the context of Canadian life form the core of this weeks videos.

Problems experienced in an immigrant family with Canadian-born children are wonderfully expressed in **Growing Up With Immigrant Parents** (48 min. 1991). This was originally an episode of CTV's **Shirley** series. It features people in their 20's from Chinese, Jamaican, South Asian, Greek and Arabic backgrounds discussing clashes between old and new-world values.

The following two programs from Classroom Video are geared toward a Grade 9-11 audience. **Canadian Identity** (26 min. 1991) examines the decade old question of the existence of an identifiable and discrete "Canadian Culture." **Multicultural Canada** (21 min. 1991) provides an overview of the major points affecting the co-existence of separate cultures in one country. Devoid of sentimentality, it tackles the problems of racism, discrimination and multiculturalism in a straightforward manner.







COURSE OUTLINE

(Draft as of November 25, 1993)

Course Description

Higher education 513 addresses selected issues in higher education under the general theme of "Old and New Challenges - New Responses and Developments". The course will provide a forum for common exploration and discussion, looking into issues from different viewpoints and directions, drawing from a variety of sources, and involving a number of experts from inside and outside U.B.C. as guest speakers.

Course Objectives

- 1) To examine critically some of the main issues in contemporary higher education.
- 2) To better understand the demands on the basic missions of higher education, and in particular of the university as a place of research, teaching and learning, as well as service to the community, and their relevance to the contents and the modes of delivery of the basic functions.
- 3) To promote the understanding of higher education as a field of research and study.

### Course Format and Design

After an introduction into the course and its topics, the course will be held in five all-day sessions that will be organized in seminar-style format. The various topics to be discussed are specified in the attached detailed schedule.

Each morning session will begin with group discussions (9:00 - 10:15). During this discussion, participants will be invited to share topics and issues currently relevant to their institutions, or provincially, nationally, or internationally. The particular session theme is then introduced by specific experts and the course instructor (10:30 - 12:30). Each session is held from 9:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. with 45 minutes off for lunch.

### Course Prerequisites

Since the field of topics to be covered will be broad, no prior expertise is being expected with respect to all of the themes. However, as there is no single text book covering the whole span of themes, some background readings from different sources is required which are supplied in the list of readings to be available by the beginning of December, or will be distributed during the course.

### Course Requirements

A maximum of 100% can be reached, as follows:

- 1) 25% for the preparation of a topic or issue for discussion during morning group discussion session and leading this discussion (topic to be discussed with course coordinator).
- 2) 50% for the preparation of a major paper (15-25 pages, double spaced) on one of the topics of the course (topic to be individually discussed with course coordinator). Team papers, involving a maximum of 3 co-authors, are encouraged.
- 3) 25% for special assignments such as critiques of books or articles in academic journals or position papers.

- January 29      New mission for higher education: Life long learning and continuing education - from the margin to the centre.

- Feb. 12          New ways of distance teaching and learning in higher education.  
  
Guest speakers: Dr. A. W. Bates, Executive Director, Planning and Research, Open Learning Agency, Dr. Robert Sweet, Lakehead University, Dr. Ron Neufeld, Director, Distance Education Program, UBC.
- Feb. 26          New functions, new types of universities and other higher education institutions.






