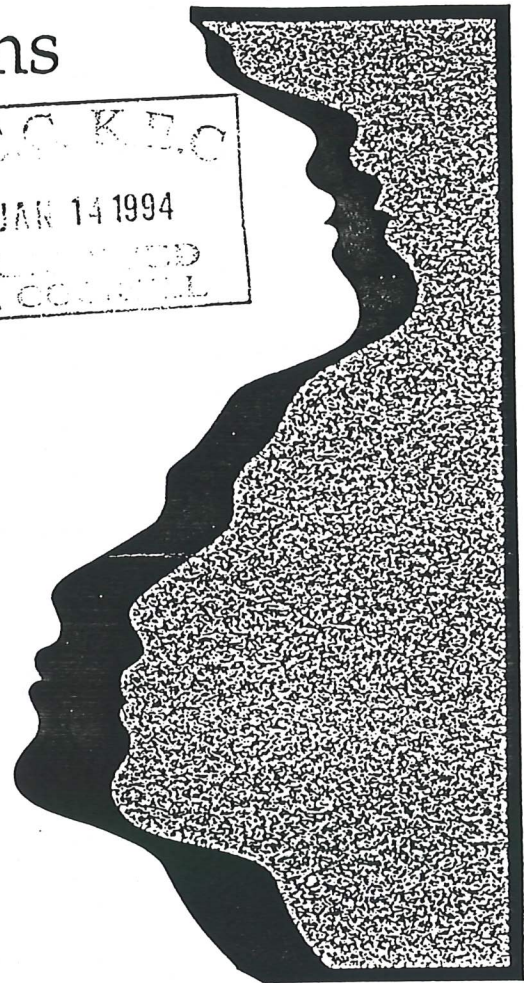
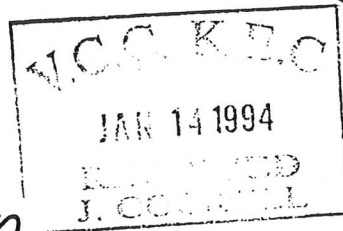



Recently the Ministry of Skills, Training and Labour and Camosun College signed a new five year agreement to operate the Centre for Curriculum and Professional Development. The role of the Centre remains to offer a service to the provincial post-secondary education system, funded by the Province of British Columbia, under the auspices of Camosun College. The Centre provides a range of services to facilitate the development of high quality educational and training programs in the college and institute system. These services include, but are not limited to, management of projects and services for curriculum and professional development and will include the operation of a high quality provincial resource centre.

The provision of these services will require liaison with the Open Learning Agency and other appropriate agencies for the purposes of curriculum publication, distribution, copyright clearance, and purchase and distribution of media resources for use in institution programs.

The Centre operates with an Advisory Board whose purpose is to provide advice, guidance and recommendations with regard to the desirability and priority of specific projects, the provision of appropriate services, and operational aspects of the Centre.

The Advisory Board is made up of three faculty members appointed by CIFA, BCGEU and the BCIT Staff Association, one member appointed by the Council of Instructional Officers, four members appointed by the Council of Chief Executive Officers, two members appointed by the Ministry of Skills, Training and Labour and the President of Camosun College which acts as the official agent of the Centre in personnel, administrative and accounting functions.

The duties of the first Centre Director were filled by the late Lorne Thompson. The Centre Advisory Board began a search for a Director many months ago, but contract discussions confused the process. With a new contract in place, the search for a new Director is reopened.

The Board wishes to make an appointment which best meets the Centre's responsibility to the system. A secondment from the post-secondary system is thought to be one way to fulfill these responsibilities. However, the Board recognizes other capable candidates exist outside the post-secondary system. Consequently, all applications will be considered to ensure examination of the widest range of candidates possible.

The successful applicant will be someone who has a solid history of interest and success in applying curriculum and professional development strategies to the improvement of the teaching and learning environment. The term of appointment will be for a period of up to five years.

Remuneration will be at a level consistent with salaries paid to individuals at the Dean/Director/Vice-President level of instructional administration at institutions.
