EASY VOICEMAIL ACCESS

Mitel has recently implemented a new access code for Voicemail. At your own telephone set you may access your voicemail box by simply entering 8*. The telephone system sends the Voicemail system your extension number as the mailbox to access, you will then be prompted for your passcode. This feature only works from your own telephone set, therefore, if you are accessing your voicemial box from elsewhere at the two colleges, you must continue to use the original code 80*XXXX where XXXX is your personal mailbox number. Take care that you do not use 8* from another person's phone as you run the risk of locking up their mailbox by entering invalid passcodes.

As well, I recently requested that voicemail box passcode be lengthened to six (6) digits. If you have not done so already please do.

To change your passcode, at anytime:

Dial into your mailbox: 8* (if calling from your own phone or 80*XXXX (XXXX is your mailbox number)

Press: U (8 key for User options)
Press: P (7 key for Passcode)

Key in: new six digit passcode; wait -

voicemail will announce back to you your new code)

Press: X (9 key to exit User options)


Press: X (9 key to exit your mailbox)

It is not just noise that can hurt can. Music, lawn mowers and household appliances can all be damaged if the sound levels are loud enough.

Le Programme des volontaires de l'EUMC intervient dans les pays suivants:

Bénin

Situé en Afrique occidentale, le Bénin anciennement connu sous le nom de Dahomey est limité au sud par le golfe du Bénin, à l'ouest par le Togo, au nord par le Niger et le Burkina Faso et à l'est par le Nigéria. La population béninoise était estimée à 4,3 millions en 1987. Plus des deux tiers de la population sont concentrés au sud du pays et environ 70 pour cent de la population vit en milieu rural. On distingue plusieurs grands groupes ethniques : les Dendis, les Batonous et les Peulhs dans le nord-est; les Sombas dans le nord-ouest; dans le centre et le sud-est, les Yorubas et les Fons; et les Adjas dans le sud-ouest. La République du Bénin compte au moins une centaine de langues cependant la langue officielle est le français.

Le Bénin est classé parmis les pays les moins avancés du monde. Malgré sa réputation de "quartier latin de l'Afrique", le pays souffre à la fois d'un manque de cadres, de techniciens et de main d'oeuvre spécialisée et paradoxalement d'une sous utilisation de ceux déjà en place.

Botswana

Located in southern Africa, Botswana is bordered by Namibia on the west, South Africa on the south and south-east, Zimbabwe on the east and Angola and Zambia to the north and north-east. The population appears small for a country so large - 1.1 million people at present. However the population is increasing rapidly. Setswana and English are the official languages in Botswana which includes six different tribes amongst its peoples.

Although much of Botswana is covered by typical African savannah and bushveld, the Kalahari desert occupies 84 percent of the land. Botswana has very little surface water. Rainfall plays an all-important role in the life of the people but rains are sporadic and sparse and droughts are common. Botswana, which gained independence from the British in 1966 exports beef, diamonds, copper, nickel, coal and soda ash.

Lesotho

This independent country, roughly the size of Vancouver Island, is surrounded entirely by South Africa. The population of just over one million is mainly comprised of the Basotho, a nation of Sesotho-speaking people founded in the 19th century by Moshoeshoe I. Sesotho and English are the official languages used.

Lesotho's mountains provide spectacular scenery but complicate the agricultural sector, since barely 15 percent of the land is suitable for cultivation. Overgrazing of animals is a severe problem although Angora sheep provide the enterprising mohair industry with the wool to create the world-famous Lesotho tapestries. The government is encouraging small industries of all kinds by providing loans and grants.



UNV Recruitment in Canada

Background

The General Assembly adopted a resolution establishing the United Nations Volunteers Programme (UNV) as of January 1, 1971.

World University Service of Canada is UNV's Canadian cooperating agency and handles the recruitment process for Canadians and landed immigrants on behalf of Geneva.

Activities

UNV is associated primarily with UN development projects, which include UNDP-assisted projects as well as projects of the specialized agencies and organizations.

Heavy emphasis is placed on appropriate technical qualifications, in anticipation of governments' requests for volunteers to work in development projects where the need for specific skills and talents is of high priority.

Development projects range from agricultural and teacher training to engine repair and city planning and offers a wide choice to able graduates from universities and technical institutions and to highly-skilled artisans.

Qualifications

Candidates must be over the age of 21, meet the health standards and personal qualifications and have at least two years of work experience in his or her field of expertise after graduation. S/he should possess a university degree or a technical diploma or have considerable practical professional or technical skill experience. Working languages include English, French and Spanish.

Conditions of Service

Work period is normally two years. Short term work is available in the field of humanitarian relief only • Travel to and from assignment is provided • Living allowance depends on the country of assignment • Housing is provided • Settling-in allowance is equal to two months' living allowance • Resettlement allowance is US\$125 per month of completed service at the end of a two-year contract • Insurance is provided.

World University Service of Canada (WUSC) is a non-profit, non-governmental organization involved in international development in two distinct ways: managing technical assistance programmes on behalf of host governments and donor agencies in developing countries, and managing the education and training requirements of international students and trainees on scholarships to study in Canada.
