STUDENT RESISTANCE IN ADULT BASIC EDUCATION

presentation by Arleen, giving the highlights of her research, and then move to questioning by her examination committee. Time permitting, others may then ask questions as well.

This ethnographic study explores the relationship between student attendance and student resistance in an Adult Basic Education classroom. Resistance is interpreted to mean the positive opposition to dominant cultures and discourses, of which schooling and literacy are The study was conducted in a community college Fundamental ABE classroom and documents evidence of student resistance, which is divided in to five categories. Comparisons of student resistance types and student attendance patterns suggest that students with more, and more varied, resistance types attended more regularly. Most of the students who attended sporadically or who dropped out of the program showed no resistance, very little resistance, or only one type of resistance. These comparisons imply that ABE teachers and programs might benefit from reframing their experience of student resistance, so that it can be perceived as a positive, political phenomenon to be recognized, valued, encouraged, and worked with, rather than against, in the ABE classroom.

Teaching/Learning Opportunity in China Shanghai East China Normal University Education The Shanghai East China Normal University is looking for four Canadian ESL teachers for a two-month position in Shanghai. One instructor is needed for a beginning level class, two for intermediate classes and one for an advanced class. The Canadian teachers would receive three days per week of Chinese language instruction and in exchange would instruct ESL classes three days per week to the Chinese students. Room and board are provided in an air conditioned hotel room with a private bathroom. 1500 Chinese yuan (approximately \$200 US) will be paid each month as pocket money. The instructors will pay their own return air fare. The program will start July 05, 1994 in Shanghai.
