HOW CAN YOU BE INVOLVED

FINANCIALLY: By pledging your personal support, by helping your Department or work area raise pledges, and by helping your work group (VEC, Regional Office or Continuing Ed) raise the most pledges per mile. "Distinctive tokens of recognition" will be presented by Tony Manera at the President's Reception during KEC's Open House, to the Department or work area that raises the most pledges per mile, and to the work group that raises the most pledges per mile. PHYSICALLY: By contacting Peter Hopkinson at local 567, or by signing the running schedule which is posted in the Faculty/Staff lounge, and committing yourself to run, jog, walk, or crawl for 15 minutes to a maximum of one hour anytime during the 24 Hour Relay. You only have to run once, you can choose your time and pace. You can run alone, with a friend, or a group of friends. You do not have to collect pledges. 
NEIGHBORHOOD PARKING

A NOTE OF INTEREST - BUSY? WHO US!

On occasion people may wonder out loud about what it is we do (if anything) in Counselling. Typically, this type of person might say "Whenever I go by your office there is hardly anybody there". In many ways it is an unfair comment because we are never sure if they are referring to us or to our clients.

Until recently our standard explanation has always been centered around: our efficiency as counsellors, the efficiency of our new appointment system, and the privacy of our new offices. However, after completing our recent work study survey, all we have to do now is to give the person a copy of the results.

Between May 17 and September 9, 1983, the Counselling Reception Staff and the Counselling Career Centre staff answered 8689 telephone calls and talked with 9342 clients who came into the Department in person. On a daily basis between July 12 and September 9th the staff handled an average of 259 individual contacts per day.

Because of the sheer volume of enquiries being handled by the Counselling Centre, be sure to let your students know that if they want to see a counsellor and not have to wait, they should book an appointment in advance. If this is impossible for them to do, or if there is an emergency, we will still squeeze them in, but, it does make things more difficult for the staff and the people who have made appointments.

The Counselling Department is open on a regular basis from 8:30 am - 7:30 pm Monday to Thursday and from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm on Fridays. Appointments or workshops outside these hours can be arranged on an individual basis with the counsellors.

TOUR BY POST SECONDARY COUNSELLORS.

Our visitors were impressed by what they saw. They liked the physical layout and the way in which the buildings are looked after - a compliment to both our security and cleaning staff. They liked the friendliness of the faculty and staff, and the way in which we worked together. Finally, they were impressed by the wide range of programs and specialized services offered by KEC.

Once again, thanks to everybody who helped out. In all it was a good prelude to our November 4 Open House.
