- The ultimate winner in the relay was the United Way whose fund was boosted by over \$1500; the precise amount is not yet known because all pledges have not yet been paid.



AIR QUALITY UPDATE AND OTHER CONCERNS

The Senior Facilities Committee met on Monday morning to review progress on the action initiated the previous week. An analysis of the air within the building is underway. You may be called upon to lend assistance, (for example, activating testing devices in your area when symptoms of pollutants become apparent).

Your reports help to indicate the source of some of our problems. If a problem is particularly severe or persistant, do not cancel your class. It may be possible to re-locate to another classroom.

Operating procedures in the mechanical trades area will be reviewed. Appropriate members of faculty from the mechanical trades will be meeting with members of administration and staff, the project manager, engineering consultant and the building engineer to ensure a fuller appreciation of the building design and its intent.

The efficient and safe handling of pollutants generated on level one should be accommodated by the building's air circulation and other systems; if this proves not to be the case, changes may have to be made. The diesel exhaust stack, for instance, is being extended by three meters. Also, weather stripping at certain doors will be added so that fumes, etc. do not get into stairwells and other areas.

Monday's meeting also reviewed recommendations the engineering consultants made respecting the noise level on the fifth, the third and the second floors. Adjustments to fans and the installation of new acoustical ceilings in certain areas was approved. (The work in the two offices and one classroom on the third floor will not commence until the new year.)

Finally, with respect to the reverberations which are felt/experienced on the second level of the east wing: we believe that adjustments to the fans, etc., which were mentioned above, may also reduce the level of reverberations. If not, we'll have to try other measures.
