MORE AWARD WINNING COST CUTTING METHODS

Thirteen institutions received awards of \$1,000 each:

Central Michigan University, for a carbon dioxide air-quality analyzer and controller.

University of Cincinnati, for converting employee files to microfilm records that are indexed on a microcomputer.

Friends University, for consolidation of its business and student-services offices.

University of Kentucky, for insuring mailed parcels itself rather than paying the postal services to do so.

Louisiana State University, for an automated blow-down system to reduce corrosion in a cooling tower.

Miami University, for designing a dolly to move library shelves.

University of Missouri at Columbia, for a computerized system to handle room reservations for classes and meetings.

University of Missouri System, for establishing roofing standards.

Orange Coast College, for cooling buildings during the day by blowing air over containers of a liquid that is frozen at night when power rates are lower.

University of Richmond, for reducing summer power costs by using waste steam from gas-powered generators to operate air-conditioning equipment.

University of South California, for computerizing its mailing services.

Southern Oregon State College, for equipping security personnel with portable wireless telephones.

Union Theological Seminary in Virginia, for adapting its air conditioning system to provide heating.

Cost-reduction awards to \$100 each were made to 26 institutions. Twenty of these institutions are:

Community College of Allegheny County, for converting reports to computer-generated micro-fiche.

University of Central Florida, for using a student assistant to handle routine maintenance of telephones.

Cornell University, for recovery of helium used in research.

Duke University, for use of the 45 telephones in the press box at its football stadium for fund raising telephones.

Edmonds Community College, for computerizing registration for continuing education courses.

Indiana Institute of Technology, for installing a gymnasium floor of compressed wood fibre.

Indiana University of Pennsylvania, for sending bills to students in two-way envelopes that eliminate separate return envelopes.

Lancaster Bible College, for a method of removing residue from hot-water heaters.

Lehigh University, for a computerized inventory-control system for gas cylinders.

Moraine Valley Community College, for financing a college centre through industrial revenue bonds and a lease agreement.

New Mexico State University, for a system to control outdoor air dampers.

State University of New York Agricultural and Technical College at Canton, for generating electricity with methane gas produced from manure.

Plymouth State College, for recovery of waste water from its cooling system.

Purdue University, for a new way to select computer based records.

Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, for a computerized system of monitoring radioactive materials and the exposure of faculty members, staff members and students to radiation.

Rio Hondo Community College, for modification of air-handling equipment.

Saint Francis College (Ind.), for insulating its science greenhouse.

University of Southern Maine, for reducing expenses of worker's compensation by providing counselling, rehabilitation and employment services.

University of Tennessee at Martin, for computerizing records and recipes for its food services.

Towson State University, for private development of residence halls and a dining facility.
