FROM THE MINISTRY

Victoria -- Education Minister Jack Heinrich today announced a \$5.8 million fund to finance college and institute projects which contribute to economic development in their areas. Heinrich said the funding is designed to encourage colleges and institutes to develop innovative and imaginative training programs. "There's a tremendous wealth of talent and potential within our network of colleges and institutes," Heinrich said. "I intend to tap that reservoir of expertise in determining how to allocate this \$5.8 million.

Heinrich said \$1.4 million will be earmarked for grants to help operations of satellite centres in interior colleges, \$3 million will go to help develop new, high-priority programs and to buy equipment to improve productivity, and \$2.4 million will be set aside to help maintain levels of service at the colleges and institutes.

The minister said the door is wide open for institutes in terms of the kinds of projects which might qualify under the \$5.8 million fund. "Our aim is to encourage creative development programs that will allow colleges and institutes to build on their particular strengths and expertise, matching them with the needs of local industry and business," the Minister said.

Examples could include projects that could provide specialized service training to resource industries, projects that help in the transfer of skills and technology to the business community or projects that could help improve production of goods and services. Heinrich said it is anticipated some of the projects could involve other provincial ministries and have federal involvement through agencies such as Canada Employment and Immigration. The MInister added he also wants to see proposals that entail the involvement of municipal governments and the province's small business sector and entrepreneurs.

Vancouver Community College recently named its top women's and men's athletes for 1984-85. Taking the honours for the women were Langara Campus basketball stars Sue Macpherson and Leah Ellis MacPherson was named to the all-Canada team at the women's national championships, held in Saskatchewan at the end of March. This ranks her as one of the top ten women players in Canada Leah Ellis was named to the all-star team at the cham pionships. Their team lost the national championship by one point in overtime. Top ranked VCC men were Langara Campus basket ball stars Marty Lutz and Jay Derksen Lutz was named to the all-Canada team at the Saskatchewan national championships, while Derksen was named to the all-star team at the championships. It was jointly sponsored by Vancouver Community College's Pacific Rim Program and by the Canadian International Development Agency.

Congratulations to instructors and students in the food trades program at the college's Vancouver Vocational Institute. They took a number of silver and bronze medals at the B.C. Chefs' Association Culinary Arts Show, held recently in Robson Square Media Centre.


In March Vancouver Community College took part in an educational fair in Hong Kong, along with 31 other institutions from Canada, the U.S., Switzerland, England and Australia The college's director of International Education, Norm Henderson, reported more than 16,000 visitors attended the three day fair. This fall, for the first time, the college will open its doors to about 50 overseas students from Hong Kong, who will take high school completion through the College Foundations division of King Edward Campus. In addition, overseas students can now compete for positions in other college programs. All programs for foreign students are offered on a cost-recovery basis. That is, there is no government subsidy to offset the tuition paid by the individual.

Career Awareness is a program run by Continuing Education, that combines lifeskills and job experience for mentally handicapped adults. At a recent graduation ceremony for 16 participants, Norman Gould of the Vancouver Kiwanis Club presented the program with two micro-computers. These will by used by students in the program to upgrade their basic literacy and numeric skills.

Brian Dwyer, of Vancouver Vocational Institute's program development department, left March 29 to undertake a special contract, through the Canadian International Development Agency, with International Rail Consultants. He will act as an educational consultant for railway manpower training systems in Tanzania and Kenya.

King Edward Campus's diesel mechanics program is continuing VCC's tradition of cooperation with business and industry. The department recently began a pilot service skills training program for Finning Tractor and Equipment, that will provide the company supprentices with an intensive two week course on Caterpillar equipment. The program was designed in cooperation with Finning's training division.

Vancouver Vocational Institute's hairdressing department is offering new programs in electrolysis and skin care, beginning in May. For clients at VVI salon, located on the campus at 250 West Pender St., this means a whole new regime of services is available, among them silk and artificial nails. cellulite treatments, aromatherapy and hair removal. All work is done by students under the supervision of instructors with many years of experience. For more information call the hairdressing department at 681-8111.
