Dear Dr. Lamoureux:

With U.B.C.'s recent decision to wind down its administration of the Ministry of Education's Instructor's Diploma Program, the Centre for Continuing Education now has the dubious task of completing a great number of participants presently enrolled in the program. Copies of letters sent to all participants and Principals announcing this decision are enclosed.

Two major decisions were made. One was to temporarily freeze admissions into the program, and the other was to hire a part-time coorindator to manage the wind-down.

I have been hired to take on the latter. As such, I have only a few, yet major, objectives. The most difficult is to determine each participant's stage of completion and establish means to complete everyone. A second is to establish ties with various institutions and corporations who are sponsoring participants, to set up opportunities to attend and complete the various courses. The third objective is to accomplish the first two in a cost effective manner.

I would, therefore, like to take this opportunity to officially introduce myself and open up the lines of communication. I am happy to take on this responsibility and will do my utmost to make the process as smooth and convenient for all concerned as I possibly can.

At this point, I only wish to let you know that there is "someone in the office," to advise you that options will be announced and negotiated with you soon and to ask you to "step forward" in the meantime with any suggestions as to how we can meet the specific needs of those participants enrolled in ID who are presently under your direction and who wish to complete.
