GET THE FACTS ON FAX

Next time you need a "hot" delivery by messenger, check to see if the recipient has a FAX machine instead. This terrific new service can help you communicate quickly and economically with other campuses, as well as other FAX subscribers nationally and internationally.

FAX, which stands for Facsimile Service, is a technology which enables the user to transmit a document (literally any document of any length) from one FAX machine to another via standard telephone networks.

It's rates are more than competitive when compared with alternative services. For example, compare the rates to send a four-page document from Vancouver to Toronto:

Telex	\$38.44	Priority Post	\$15.80
Courier	\$19.79	FAX	\$ 1.10

The FAX machine is located in the IMS office opposite the Bookstore and is operated by the IMS staff. If you're not sure whether a particular company has a FAX, check the North American and International FAX directories available in the V.V.I. Library.
