POLICY:

- A.1 Professional engagements, consulting and other forms of employment related to an employee's College responsibilities are desirable enhancements of employees' professional development. The College will approve such activities, subject to the conditions stated in this policy and other related policies.
- A.2 Employees of the College may not accept outside employment which will interfere with their College duty unless prior approval, in accordance with established procedures for requesting leave, is received in writing from the President or delegate.
- A.3 Where an employee engaged in an activity as described in A.1 and A.2 is in receipt of compensation, other than reimbursement for out-of-pocket expenses, from the external agency employing him, the employee's College salary shall be reduced by either the amount of such compensation or the amount of regular College salary, whichever is less, if the time committed is in conflict with College duty.

FRED NASO NAMED CHEF OF THE YEAR

Fred Naso, Food Trades Department Head was honored by the BC Chefs' Association, receiving the 1982 "Chef of the Year" award. This award is given to top caliber chefs' whose dedication and energy devoted to the Association is recognized and acknowledged with a trophy of merit. Fred is the 12th recipient of the Chef of the year award presented to him at the 24th Annual President's Ball and Awards dinner at the Inn of the Denman Place last month. Fred has been with the 190-member Association for 20 years and has served on the Board of Directors for the past 7 years.

Fred, an instructor at the VVI since 1968, was born in Calabria, Southern Italy where he first studied the culinary art with the Catholic nuns. When he was 16 he came to Vancouver and worked at the White Spot Drive-Inn. Then it was on to the Hotel Vancouver where he served his seven year apprenticeship. Fred worked with Regency Caterers and the North Vancouver's Coach House Motor Inn before coming to instruct at the VVI.

The BC Chefs' Association has helped to increase the number of chefs apprentice in BC from 25 ten years ago to 250 today. The Association pays the first six months tuition for BC Secondary School graduates going into Chef Training.

DENTAL HEALTH CARE SERVICE!!

In conjunction with the UBC hygiene students the VVI Dental Assisting program offered a "Dental Health Care Opportunity" for children 3 years of age and up, including adults. This gave the Dental Assistants an opportunity to learn and to work as a team as they will within the dental office. These clients were given complete treatment and dental health education; this may include full mouth survey and X-Rays, comprehensive intra-oral examinations, polishing and fluoride, and brushing and flossing instruction, the taking of vital signs, the taking of impressions, and pouring of study models.

Over 1,000 clients are reviewed for these sessions from a file of recall clients and new clients. Each student will see 20 clients during this session until June. These clients are also screened by Vancouver Dentists who visited the Department.

These Dental Clinics are offered every Spring free of charge. The dental profession encourages the rapport this establishes within the Dental Community.

The Admission to Simon Fraser University's Graduate Studies in Education
Of

Applicants Lacking a Bachelor's Degree

POLICY

The Faculty of Education, recognizing the professional and educational significance of post-secondary qualifications other than a Bachelor's Degree will receive applications for admission to the M.Ed. degree from individuals who lack a Bachelor's Degree.

REGULATIONS

1. Applicants will be eligible for competitive selection to graduate study when they possess either:
 - i) a set of post-secondary educational qualifications usually amounting to three or four years of formal study showing evidence of academic/professional achievement of a minimum of B quality (S.F.U.=3.0 CGPA; UBC 74%).
 - or can demonstrate
 - ii) a well established professional career; substantial and/or deversified professional experience in fields related to the proposed area of research; commitment, dedication and task orientation; and attested professional competence and promise.

2. Persons wishing to become eligible, e.g. persons holding positions in community colleges, technical and vocational institutes, are advised to complete the Instructor's Diploma and either the Diploma in Adult Education at the University of British Columbia or 30 semester hours of approved upper levels undergraduate coursework at Simon Fraser with a CGPA of 3.0 before seeking admission to a graduate degree program.

3. Applications will be considered individually, on a case-by-case basis.

PROCEDURES

1. Applicants under this policy must submit, in addition to other required documents, complete documentation on all post-secondary qualifications together with a covering letter explaining any unusual or noteworthy features of these qualifications and demonstrating how these qualifications amount to at least three years of formal post-secondary study.
2. Applicants must also submit complete documentation on their professional experience.
3. Applicants selected for admission will normally be admitted on a qualifying basis for the first semester with the requirements that they achieve a minimum cumulative grade point average of 3.0 in course(s) during that semester. Upon successful completion of these courses students will be granted clear admission retroactively with retroactive course and residence credit.

THE DIPLOMA PROGRAM IN ADULT EDUCATION

The U.B.C. Faculty of Education and the Centre for Continuing Education jointly offer a Diploma Program in Adult Education. This program is designed for practitioners in the broad field of adult education, who wish to acquire or improve the skills and knowledge required to organize, conduct, evaluate and generally administer programs in adult education but who, for a variety of reasons, do not wish to pursue a graduate degree.

1. The Course of Study

The program requires 15 units of course work, of which 12 units are in adult education and 3 units are electives chosen in consultation with an academic advisor assigned to each student. A brief field experience forms an integral part of the program.

The program should be completed within five years from admission, either by full-time or part-time study.

The program may be completed by extra-session evening classes or by correspondence.

Each student is assigned a faculty advisor. In consultation with this advisor, the student plans a course of studies, and the field experience.

A Diploma is issued to successful candidates by the University of British Columbia. Several institutions and employers recognize the Diploma in Adult Education as an indication of level of attainment.

The course work in the Diploma Program is as follows:

Examinations of human learning processes, with emphasis on the adult years, with focus on major theories of learning, characteristics of adult learners, basic forms and processes of learning, and the changes in intellectual functioning with aging.

Basic Counselling Skills for Vocational Instructors AE 2087-282

Through their classroom interaction with students, vocational instructors inevitably are told of or observe indications of personal problems which hinder or interfere with learning. Concerned instructors are often uncertain about the appropriateness of their involvement with these problems. Many who make a personal decision to be involved, are unsure about the effectiveness of their interventions. This workshop will provide vocational instructors with an opportunity to clarify the counselling implications of their instructional role, and to acquire the skills and strategies to deal with these situations.
