
Pacific Rim mag humming along

Well over a hundred VCC students now have a stake in this year's version of *Pacific Rim Magazine*. With help and urging from many instructors, the publication's writers, editors, photographers, designers, sales reps, and illustrators are working toward its successful production.

The content will be varied, ranging from refles of fascinating people with Pacific connections (a Shan nobleman now at UBC, for one) to fact sheets about countries important to B.C. economically and culturally. These pages will help travellers, armchair or airborne, learn about the part of the world they'll be visiting. Gathering this useful information are Marilyn Ming's Library Tech students, who are at the same time learning some essentials about their future work.

Topics of other features include drift-net fishing, dragon-boat racing, Chinese Festivals, Thai kick-boxing, the concept of "face" and women's status in Japan to list just a few. And a scoop is in the making: a group of Ross Johnson's Political Science students from Langara who visited Thailand has generated a set of questions which, thanks to Peter Bailey, an expert on that country, will be posed to the Thai Prime Minister.

That feature is not yet complete, but a mass of material is in hand, and being

polished under the supervision of Editor Brian Campbell and Associate Editor Diane Quinton.

And Director of Photography, Jacquie Dreher, has had her crew out on a variety of shoots to illustrate the pieces. Their work is nearly finished, though some awaits better weather--shots of real dragon boats, for example, to supplement those taken of

practise canoes on a soggy January Saturday.

The camera clickers are guided by excellent sketches produced by the illustration and design crew, steered by Consultant Ron Woodward. Thanks to cooperation from the City Centre Print Production Department, Ron is now teaching members of this group the Pagemaker program to help them in their work.

City Centre also has some researchers from Terry Mills' Business and Transportation course looking into delivery methods--the mag will go overseas to VCC's International Education outposts, and to other destinations. Our own mailing list is also a City Centre project, with Terry Moore, one of Brock Elliott's Data Processing students, working on a complex program to make the addresses as useful as possible.

So with some of its space already sold, much of its content nearly ready, and most of its distribution network in place (16,500 go out via *The Financial Post*), *PRM* # 2 is shaping up fairly well for its September appearance.
